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Martin Sends Wire To Chief Executive

PORTLAND, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Governor Charles Martin, in disclosing to-night that he had sent President Roosevelt a "confidential" telegram dealing with the maritime tie-up, told the Associated Press that west coast governors "are at the end of their rope" and that "I am tired of seeing our country ruined."

He said his telegram was an "individual move on my part" but that he "understood" governors of Washington, Idaho and California were taking similar action. He termed the telegram "interesting" but declined to reveal its contents.

Coos Bay Registers Coldest n 4 Years

NORTH BEND, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Coos river froze today as the temperature sank to 17 degrees above zero, the coldest here since December 10, 1932. It hampered the flow of water through Port Orford's municipal water system. The temperature there went to 20 degrees. Coquille reported 16 degrees. Myrtle Point 26, and Reedsport 20. Pipes in Coos Bay homes and automobile radiators froze. Silvery icicles at springs and along Coos river attracted many spectators.
