TEMPERATURE NINE HERE ON THURSDAY

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Wednesday broke up the ice that formed over the lake.

Throughout the county, varying low temperatures were listed. At Waterville, the thermometers recorded the minimum at 6 degrees above zero. At McKenzie Bridge the reading was 3 degrees below zero and at 8 a. m. the temperature still was at 1 degree below zero.

The minimum for the coast area remained at 21, the same mark as for the preceding day. A slight northeast wind was blowing along the coast, Thursday morning.

Triangle lake reported its minimum 10 degrees above zero. The lake was frozen over about 4 feet out from the banks.

While the upper McKenzie reported only crusts of ice along the banks, many of the little creeks flowing into the river were frozen over entirely.

OREGON COLDEST SPOT IN NATION

an unofficial reading. In Montana the numbing cold caused two deaths. Blizzards in Utah, Nevada, Arizona and other mountain states marooned scores of travelers and left highways closed with snow. Several snow-bound Utah cities were on fuel rations.

A snowstorm, the heaviest recorded in 20 years, swung into southern and central Arizona from the north.

Rescue Parties Out

At Cedar City, Utah, a railroad wrecker battered through snow drifts to rescue nine bus passengers marooned 14 hours. Snow plows struggled through eight-foot drifts at Winslow, Ariz., to rescue marooned motorists.

In Nebraska two trains stalled in snow drifts and many highways were blocked. Ice sheathed highways made traffic hazardous in Iowa and Wisconsin. Highways out of Las Vegas, Nev., were blocked last night and the fate of a rescue party of four, headed toward three persons stranded at a mine, was unknown.

The chill wave spread southward across Texas, sending the mercury to nine degrees above zero at Amarillo at midnight. Freezing temperatures were due to extend to the Gulf coast by night.

Mild temperatures and rain were general in the east.

CORVALLIS, Jan. 7.—(P)—Intoxication comes chiefly in the "wee small hours," police decided Wednesday, and asked the city council to prepare an ordinance stopping the sale of beer and wine at midnight. The closing hour permitted by the state liquor control commission is 1 a. m. Corvallis already restricts liquor to beer and wine and confines dispensing places to the downtown district.

TILLAMOOK, Jan. 7.—(P)—The new structure over the Trask river will be named Providence bridge as a permanent tribute to its builders, 160 young CCC workers from Rhode Island. Many of them live at Providence. The easterners reached Oregon in November, fighting forest fires for several weeks before turning their hands to construction.

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Budget Message Friday

His next message tomorrow will transmit the budget for the fiscal year beginning in July and request a supplemental relief appropriation to carry until then.

Administration leaders predicted "surprises" in the budget. No substantial cutting down of relief was expected, but a closer approach to "pay as you go" was hinted.

The budget proposals will outline the legislative program in some greater detail on the basis of the general statements in yesterday's message. Vice-president Garner's signature to the embargo resolution will send it to the White House tomorrow, as the first item on the program.

Extend RFC Authority

Next will come action to extend the reconstruction finance corporation's lending authority, the president's power to change the gold value of the dollar, and the \$2,000,000,000 stabilization fund.

Leading up to wage and hour regulation, Mr. Roosevelt said he would submit recommendations later on slum clearance, low cost housing, and to farm tenants and broadening of the social security act.

Federal Laws Needed

Action by the separate states to protect the laboring man and assure a "just return" for agriculture was a prime impossibility, he said, and "federal laws supplementing state laws are needed."

From this some senators judge that a federal-state wage and hour program may be attempted, possibly using some device such as the tax remittance in the unemployment insurance section of the security act to foster state cooperation.

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
