

FRIGID GRIP OF WINTER CONTINUES IN EUGENE REGION

log, the mercury read 1 degree below zero in the Chase Gardens community. Freezing temperatures during the past week have brought considerable trouble to the Eugene power plant, according to J. W. McArthur, superintendent of the water board. With ice reported in the Leaburg canals, neither of the channels were able to carry water to their capacity. There is also trouble reported on the Watterville lines and intakes.

Extra care is being taken by the Eugene water system, too, to keep its power dam and operations clear of ice on the McKenzie. Water in the Leaburg plant forebay has frozen over the past two mornings, the ice being strong enough to support a man. "Anchor ice" has been forming down in the water and was reported as thick as five feet. This ice clogs the entrance of the penstock and keeps workmen on the job during the mornings that operations must be stopped.

The Leaburg and Watterville plants were halted for a time, Thursday, to clear the ice.

The McKenzie valley is a beautiful sight at this time. All the fields that shoot down the banks along portions of the highway are frozen solid. Thick ice, extended over the entire "lake" in front of Seymour's chateau and extended for a comparatively long distance up the river.

The Willamette river was frozen almost entirely across above the millrace Friday morning, a small movement of water in the center being the only place without ice.

Millrace Covered
The millrace was covered with thicker ice, Friday, having frozen across Thursday. The Siuslaw had ice entirely across at Mapleton again Friday.

Many ponds, caused either from surface water or in marshy lands, are popular places for ice-skating these days, a group of about 40 finding such a place on Horn lane, Thursday night.

Solidly frozen snow continues to cover the nearby hills around Eugene. At Cascade summit 44 inches of snow are packed down. About two inches lie on the ground at Oakridge, frozen solidly.

Stream Very Narrow
The upper Willamette river in the vicinity of Oakridge is frozen from bank to bank except for a narrow strip in the center where the water is swift. This unfrozen strip is about ten feet wide and presents an unusual appearance, according to Van Sverdrup, who was in that locality on Thursday.

Five fires seem to have taken up most of the Eugene fire department's attention during the cold spell of the past three days. On Thursday afternoon the department answered a call to 221 Third avenue east, and followed Friday morning by going out to 158 Twelfth avenue east and 831 Fifth avenue west, where two more fires were reported. There was also a roof fire Thursday afternoon at 1100 Olive, where the fire was extinguished after some damage.

Those Eugeneans who are trying to correct meter trouble during these wintry mornings are advised to call the water department. This was the word Friday morning from J. W. McArthur, superintendent, after he had received stories of broken and frozen meters. It was stressed that hot water or a fire only adds the danger of over-expansion or other disorders in the meter. By calling the department, residents will save much trouble since an experienced representative can remedy the difficulty.

LEGISLATURE HAS RULING AUTHORITY

Multnomah circuit court in the proceedings brought by Delmore Lessard to establish his right to a seat in the senate regardless of his position as an attorney for a state commission and despite the fact he was a notary public.

Lessard sought an injunction to restrain Earl Suel as secretary of state from declaring his seat vacant because of an attorney general's opinion the positions held by Lessard disqualified him. Judge Winter denied the injunction, from which Lessard appealed.

Affects Other Senators
The supreme court's opinion, handed down a day and half after arguments were heard, not only affected the status of Lessard but those of Senators W. H. Strayer of Baker and Walter E. Pearson of Portland. The meetings of county courts in their districts set for this afternoon to name successors to disqualified senators were cancelled as a result of the ruling.

By indirectness the supreme court held the statute, giving the secretary of state the right to declare a vacancy, unconstitutional. Justice Belt held the power of passing upon the qualifications of the legislators was given solely to the members of each house by constitutional provision.

Notary Commissions Matter
In the test suit to determine his eligibility as senator because of his holding the position as attorney for the World War veterans state aid commission, Lessard injected the matter of notary commissions, which resulted in the forfeiture by more than a dozen legislators of their notarial commissions, and contest over the other two senate seats.

Since no vacancies exist, all contested senators will take their seats in the legislature next Monday unless their qualifications are challenged on the floor by other members.

BALANCED BUDGET UP TO BUSINESS

prison law required for debt reduction.

But he stressed that "if improvement in economic conditions continues at the present rate," the government would "be able to attain in 1935 a completely balanced budget with full provision for meeting the statutory requirements for debt reduction."

Final figures on relief outlays were withheld until later. Mr. Roosevelt said about \$550,000,000 of additional funds would be needed to carry on work relief through June 30.

Expenses 7 Billion
Including the estimated relief sum, expenditures for the 1935 period would aggregate \$7,694,000,000—a drop of \$786,000,000 under projected outlays for the current fiscal year.

Mr. Roosevelt, citing generally improving business conditions, forecast next year's receipts at \$7,238,000,000. Thus eliminating \$401,515,000 of debt retirement from the expenditure column, income would match outgo for the first time since 1930.

The budget provided funds for no new governmental activities. It referred to a promised message on administrative reorganization which Mr. Roosevelt said "will undoubtedly result in some saving in expenditures."

To keep present revenue channels open, the executive recommended extension of a group of miscellaneous taxes scheduled to expire next June and July. He urged that levies which automatically would be reduced next June be retained at current rates.

The predicted increase in public debt from \$24,405,163,000 today to \$25,026,000,000 in six months was attributed in part to the request for a supplemental appropriation of \$790,000,000—\$650,000,000 for relief and activities of the resettlement administration; the remainder for relief obligations to be created this year and paid next.

CCC Fund Asked
Included also was a request for \$100,000,000 to finance projected extension of the Civilian Conservation Corps from March 31 to June 30. Funds also were provided for the CCC in 1935, and Mr. Roosevelt recommended that congress make the corps a permanent government agency.

The budget envisioned liquidation of the public works administration as such providing only \$10,000,000 for administrative expenses in 1935. But at a press conference in which Mr. Roosevelt and his top-flight financial advisers answered reporters' questions about the new budget, it was explained the \$200,000,000 PWA revolving fund would be used for loans and grants to municipalities during the remainder of this fiscal year whenever the money was employed to give work to persons on work relief rolls.

For a general public works program next year, including roads, rivers and harbors and such items, the budget provided outlays of \$451,108,000—an estimate in line with Mr. Roosevelt's previously announced policy for a "permanent" program costing around \$500,000,000 annually.

Douglas, Jr., 25, succumbed to pneumonia. The younger Douglas, also an attorney, was a graduate of Willamette university.

professor of Latin and Greek at Willamette university in Salem, finally joining the Oregon faculty in 1898. His kindly interests and charming personality made him one of the most popular of all faculty members during his 35 years service with the campus.

Death Is Mourned
His passing is mourned by hundreds of friends and faculty members as well as by the many students and alumni who have known him.

Dr. C. Valentine Boyer, president of the University of Oregon, issued the following statement upon learning of Mr. Dunn's death:

"The death of Professor Dunn is a severe blow to the University of Oregon as well as to the classic world in which he was a most prominent figure. Because of his rare personality and his long-time services to the institution, he seemed a part of Oregon itself. Indeed, death has removed one of the most able men from the ranks of our faculty,

leaving a vacancy which will be most difficult to fill."

Professor Dunn was a past president of the Classical Association of the Pacific states and a regional committee member for the Classical League. Likewise, he was interested in several other organizations devoted to classical work. He had more than 70 articles published in several classical periodicals. Professor Dunn was a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Gamma Mu. He had been associated long with Masonic groups in Eugene and also was a member of the Eugene Elks lodge and the Sons of the American Revolution.

Surviving Mr. Dunn are his widow, Mrs. Anna Matthews Dunn; one daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Dunn Barrett of Eugene; one son, Frederic Berrian Dunn of San Francisco; three grandsons; one granddaughter; and three sisters, Mrs. C. S. Williams of Eugene, Miss Amy Dunn of Palo Alto, Cal., and Mrs. Edna Dingles of Berkeley, Cal.

Arrangements for the funeral services will be announced later from the Branstetter-Simon chapel.
