POTATOES HIGHER. EGGS DROP AGAIN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—The position of the treasury on January 8: Receipts, \$118,750,712.48; expenditures, \$69,803,810; balance, \$1,988,926,876.61; customs receipts for the month, \$50,626,572.76.

Receipts for the fiscal year (since July 1), \$2,235,051,915.42; expenditures, \$3,862,211,852.59, including \$1,476,004,392.37 of emergency expenditures; excess of expenditures, \$1,627,159,344.17; gross debt, \$24,457,762,636.66, an increase of \$32,928,762.25 over the previous day; gold assets, \$11,270,573,697.59, including \$39,475,791.71 of inactive gold.

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PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8.—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)

Reports from 114 mills showed last week's new business of 63,491,000 feet was 9 per cent under the previous week's mark, the Western Pine association said today. Production totaled 37,788,000 as compared with 38,600,000 the previous week, and shipments reached 32,803,000 as compared with 33,112,000 the previous week. Orders, shipments and production exceeded totals for the corresponding week of 1936. To date, orders were reported 31 per cent above the same period a year ago.

STOCK MARKET PUSHES AHEAD IN FIRM RALLY

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—The stock market accepted President Roosevelt's budget message in a favorable light today, together with other market factors, and pushed forward in one of the broadest advances in weeks.

Prices pushed up from a few cents to \$3 or more a share, and in some cases even wider gains were recorded. The Rail and Steel company shares led the movement, and Aircraft, Shipbuilding and Specialty stocks joined. Transfers approximated 3,800,000 shares.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Notwithstanding price rallies associated with uneasiness about reported landing of Italian troops in Spain, the wheat market ruled lower today.

Snowfalls in domestic winter wheat territory southwest were regarded as the most beneficial to crops since November, 1931. R. O. Cromwell estimated wheat reserve supplies on farms in the United States as 140,000,000 bushels, against 164,000,000 this time last year and 138,000,000 in 1935.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Jan. 8.—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "The market for wool is stronger this week both here and abroad. Average fine wools are up a cent or so in the last week and medium wools are also against the buyer. In the foreign primary markets there is rather more advance, in consequence of the buying furor of the Japanese and Australia, South America and South Africa. Yorkshire has advanced Marino top prices 1 1/2 to 2 pence per pound. "In this market, scoured wools have been especially strong, owing to the government request for bids on CCC cloths in large quantity. "The piece goods market is healthy and moderately active, although rather reluctant to pay the higher asking prices. "A little scattered contracting is reported through the west at firm prices.
