LESS CASH ASKED FOR RECLAMATION

The president put the question of a balanced federal income and expenditures up to industry today. Delivering his budget message to congress, he predicted a public debt peak of \$35,000,000,000 next June 30, the end of the fiscal year, and said his budget would remain in balance if relief expenditures did not exceed \$1,537,123,000.

A 30 per cent increase in appropriations for government activities in National park forests and the public domain was sought. The budget called for nearly \$60,000,000.

For western reclamation projects, the president asked \$34,000,000, a decrease of \$17,000,000 from the appropriations for 1936-37. Included in this

sum would be \$500,000 for Owyhee and \$125,000 for the Klamath projects of Oregon.

The president recommended an appropriation of \$181,500,000 for public road construction, an increase of \$113,500,000.

He took time out from a busy day to affix his signature to a special resolution embargoing munitions shipments to Spain.

Gambling Devices Hit By Ordinances

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 9.—(AP)—Portland appeared on the way to "whole hog or none" as far as punchboards and so-called gambling devices were concerned today. The city council set Jan. 21 as the deadline when punchboards must be ousted almost at the same time that City Commissioner J. E. Bennett proposed five ordinances with the suggestion they either be passed or the question of gambling thrown open to public vote on a municipally-operated lottery program.

Noted Churchman To Speak In Eugene

The Central Presbyterian church members this week entertain Dr. Henry B. Master of Philadelphia, moderator or chief presiding officer for the Presbyterian church in the United States.

Dr. Master will speak in the church Friday evening, January 15. A dinner for all members of the church will be given, followed by a public meeting at 7:15 o'clock at which time Dr. Master will give an address. Rev. Norman K. Tully, pastor of Central Presbyterian church, extends an invitation to all interested to hear Dr. Master at 7:15 o'clock.

Dr. Master is a graduate of Princeton and the Princeton Theological seminary. He was ordained to the Presbyterian ministry in 1898. Dr. Master served many churches in the country and for 22 years was western or American secretary of the Alliance of Reformed Churches

throughout the world holding the Presbyterian system. Among his fellow churchmen he is known as "a conservative of the conservatives."

All lovers of the poetry of Robert Burns will be invited to join in a memorial celebration of the poet's memory to be held on the anniversary of his birth, January 25. Plans for the evening were discussed at a meeting of the executive committee of the Robert Burns Memorial society held Friday evening. Angus Gibson, Junction City, will speak on the "Life of Burns" and Rev. Robert Higgins, both on "The Democracy of Burns." A program will include vocal and instrumental rendering of Scottish airs, followed by refreshments and a social gathering. Officers of the society include Alex. L. Williamson, president; Colin Mackenzie, vice-president and David Masterton, past president.

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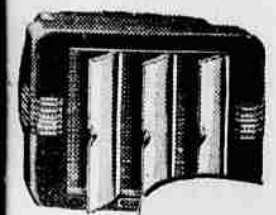

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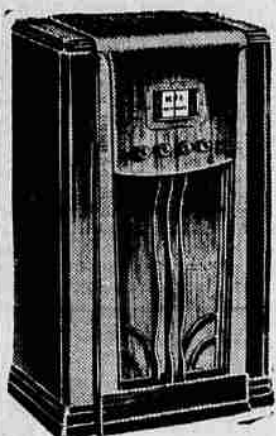

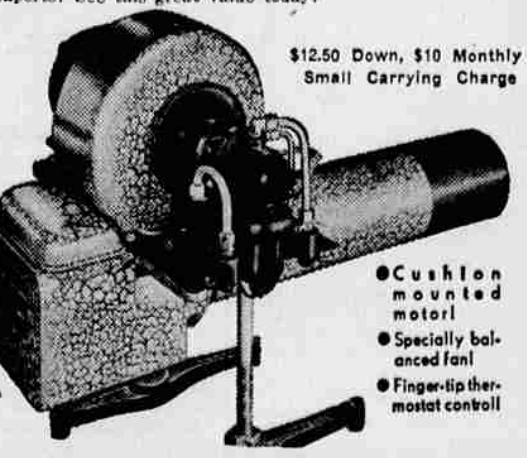
