

Few Price Changes Noted In Market; Stocks Are Irregularly Higher

COLORED HENS OVER 4 1-2 LBS. ADVANCE 1 CENT PER POUND

The only price change in the Eugene markets, reported Wednesday, was that the buying price of colored hens over 4 1/2 pounds advanced a cent a pound, the quotation being 14 to 16 cents.

Wheat remained at \$1.03 a bushel and other grains and hay were the same as before.

MARKET ACTIVE BUT UNABLE TO MAKE REAL GAIN

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Although the stock market milled around energetically today, only specialties and low-priced utilities managed to hold the buying limelight consistently. Volume approximated 2,900,000 shares.

Some analysts focused attention on the fact that although trading has swelled recently, the market seemingly has been unable to get anywhere. This "churning," they said, suggested the possibility some traders may have been reducing commitments pending settlement of strikes in motor and allied industries.

CHICAGO, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Wheat scored a maximum advance of 1 3/8 cents a bushel late today, helped by reports that Germany and Italy were both purchasing grain in Argentina.

A relatively buoyant trend of wheat prices at Minneapolis and Winnipeg attracted notice. Upturns of wheat markets was aided at times by new high price records for corn.
