

UNIFORM SIGNS WILL BE TOPIC OF TRAFFIC MEET

Principles which will govern the development of a uniform system of signs for cities and counties in the state will be studied by the committee on uniform traffic signs at a meeting of Oregon Cities at a time to be held in Salem, January 21, at 8 o'clock this evening. The meeting was called by J. J. Franzen, city manager of Oregon and chairman of the committee. A

sub-committee of the league's committee has compiled considerable information from questionnaires sent out to Oregon cities and this will be used as a basis for discussion at the committee meeting, January 29. The sub-committee has found a serious lack of uniformity and the league committee is now ready to take definite steps toward developing a uniform system throughout the state. Mr. Franzen says.

Cooperation of the counties along this line has been promised by Frank Shall, president of the Association of Oregon Counties, and Judge F. L. Phipps, secretary.

MONTGOMERY-WARD CATALOG IS OUT

The new Montgomery-Ward catalog for the spring and summer of 1937 is now being released to approximately 8,500,000 families throughout the United States. It was announced today by the local branch of the company. Officials say that the new catalog, designed to sell merchandise for the next six month period, gives a clear indication of what may be expected in the way of improved business conditions. The new catalog gives evidence of these claims in that a wide variety of articles have been added to the line usually carried by the company stores. Largest additions are found in the

section devoted to farm supplies where a complete line of tillage tools has been added, the poultry department enlarged, garden tractors listed for the first time, and a complete line of nursery stock listed with illustrations. All articles listed will soon be available through the catalog order department of the retail store here or will be on display in the store, according to Dana P. Washburn, Ward's store manager. Distribution of the catalog will require about 60 days. The book is 80 pages larger than those of 1936, and will have a circulation increase of about 500,000 copies. The catalog also announces that size of purchases that can be made on the company's time payment plan has been reduced from \$20 to \$10. William C.
