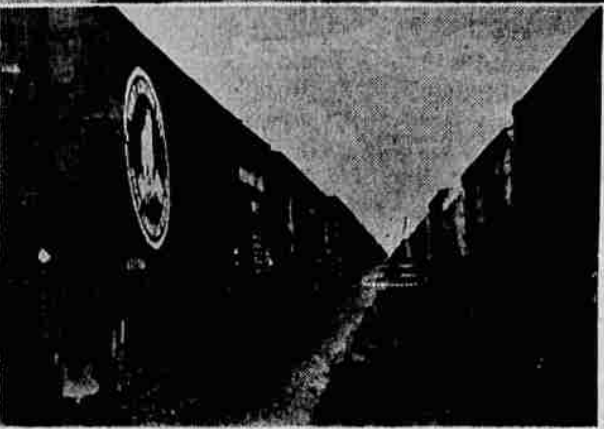


MANY SIGN FOR ASSOCIATE LIST OF GLEEMEN GROUP

turning basin in the Vancouver region, estimated to cost \$22,000.

Another smaller project gets third place, a 10 foot channel in the Ekomim Slough, to cost \$16,000. Fourth place is allotted a 30 foot channel at St. Helena, to cost \$20,000.

The huge and highly important project in the Willamette River basin, providing for bank protection and channels in the Willamette and its tributaries, comes fifth on the list, estimated to cost \$2,430,000. Sixth place is allotted to the Portland sewage project, for which a cost of \$9,575,000 is estimated.

The report includes 24 other projects, some of which are levee improvement near Portland, estimated to cost \$1,050,000; construction of levees and drainage works in the Sauvie Island area, \$1,864,000; precipitation measurement, stream gaging and other projects for the lower Columbia basin totaling more than \$500,000, and a number of others.

Priority Given Dam

In the middle Columbia basin the priority is given to the construction of the combined navigation and power dam, work on which is already in progress, estimated in the report to cost \$2,650,000. Second choice goes to the extensive and highly regarded stock water development in the eastern part of the basin, estimated at \$170,800. Construction of a seven foot navigation channel from Celilo to Umatilla is listed third, with a cost estimated at \$250,000. Flood channel improvements in the Umatilla at Pendleton, to cost \$20,000 are put in fourth place. Fifth and sixth priorities are construction of flood control works and channel improvements north of Walla Walla, estimated to cost more than \$2,237,000.

Projects calling for construction of stock water and irrigation systems near Mitchell, Bend and Sisters call for more than \$72,000. Projects listed for this basin total 26, and in addition, some 20 other projects described as "deferred" are included.

Priority in the Oregon Pacific basin is allotted to the Roseburg sewage disposal plant, for which PWA plans have already been drawn, at a cost of \$85,000. Second place is accorded the line tunnel at Talent City to prevent cave-in, to cost \$10,000. A permanent diversion dam in the Bear Creek district on the Rogue river valley, to cost \$25,000 is placed third. Extension of the south jetty in the Umpqua river, a project estimated at \$900,000, is listed next. Construction of a pumping plant and reservoir, at a cost of \$120,000, at Toledo, is included next. A total of 17 projects is listed for this area.

The reports on the North minor basin include nine projects, chiefly to provide water for irrigation and for stock, totalling approximately \$550,000. The North Pacific-Klamath River basin report includes a project listed as first in priority which would provide drainage, flood control and irrigation in Klamath county, estimated to cost \$504,000. Second place in importance is investigational work in the Klamath basin estimated to cost \$98,000, while third place is allotted to the Klamath Indian Reservation irrigation improvement project estimated to cost \$25,600. Sewage disposal plants at Malin and Klamath Falls, to cost \$102,700, are listed next. More than a dozen other projects, many of them in northern California, are included.

Important Oregon projects included in the Snake river basin section include completion of the Owyhee irrigation project, at a cost of \$1,500,000; construction of a reservoir and power plant for irrigation at Powder River, listed sixth in priority, at a cost of \$3,045,000. Approximately 50 projects, listed in the "immediate construction" classification, in Idaho and Washington as well as Oregon, are included in this report.

Parts of southern Oregon would benefit from projects listed for the Sacramento Basin region, the reports show.

Each basin report gives a wealth of data on the region it covers, including population, need for the projects, and definite data should projects be included immediately.

January Tourists

Increase Over '36

Despite bad weather, tourist travel in Oregon showed an upward lift for January 1937 over the previous January, figures received from the state motor association by the chamber of commerce here revealed. This past January 2750 travelers registered at association offices, as compared with 2117 last season. Of these 890 were from Washington and 872 from California, with the rest shared in smaller numbers by other states.

Eugene was fifth on the list in number of tourists registered, marking up 120 names. Ashland led the rest of the offices in registrations.

and Machinery company, and exports of more than 2000 tons in iron and steel junk will move out immediately, according to Sam D. Bornstein, general manager.

Canned Goods Needed

Pacific Fruit and Produce company developed a shortage of canned goods during the strike, and carloads of canned goods, Florida grapefruit, and soups will be shipped in to fill out warehouse stocks. Western States Grocery company have had shipments of citrus fruits, Louisiana rice, southern canned fish, and other California canned goods held up in San Francisco. So swamped with orders are shipping companies that shipments could not be promised by the McCormick line until probably the fourth least out.

Many carloads of oats, corn, bran, cyster shell, and concentrates are being shipped in to fill shortages in feed warehouses. V. J. Gillespie, manager of the Lane County Farmers' Cooperative expressed his opinion that the 20 percent rise in feed prices in the last 90 days has been indirectly a result of the strike and that prices will readjust themselves when the market supply is normal again.
