Date Shipment Is Received In Eugene

An innovation in bread baking was begun Saturday with the arrival of a large shipment of fresh dates from India, Calif., for Williams bakery. This is said to be the first shipment of dates ever received in Eugene in which they were picked right from the tree and delivered fresh without any processing or drying whatever. The dates will be used in a specialty bread that will be offered Tuesday under the name of Date-Nut.

These are the same date travelers in the desert country of southern California have seen sold along the roads around India, and featured in the restaurants. This is practically the only place in the United States where these dates are grown in commercial quantities.

The recipe used in the baking of this new bread was just received by Mr. Williams from the experimental baking department of a large eastern milling company, and the bread is said to be entirely different from any bread yet baked here and very delicious.
