RAIDS ON COUNTY FAIRS PROTESTED

Counties are allowed to their educational fairs. Mr. Chingren said. In his reference to "everything else," Mr. Chingren pointed out all the community and minor celebrations around the state—strawberry festivals, red-head roundups, potato shows, etc., could come in and "take a cut," receiving more than the counties would for their educational activities.

Portland Raid Suspected
The way the bill is drawn it means the counties will get no more than they have been, despite the statement of increased allotments, the state fair man said. He claims, also, that the figures given out by some of the groups asking "cuts" are "fictitious."

In the bill the following apportionments would be set aside: Oregon state fair, not more than \$40,000; Pacific International livestock exposition, not more than \$35,000; Portland rose festival, not more than \$10,000; eastern Oregon livestock show, not more than \$7,500; Pendleton roundup, not more than \$7,500. The statement from Salem pointed out other community affairs about the state were included in the distributions as provided by the bill. "And that is the joker," Mr. Chingren commented.

ROOSEVELT HOLDS "NO CHANGE" IDEA

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—(AP)—President Roosevelt re-emphasized to congress today his conviction that economic social legislation can be enacted within the constitution. He concluded a special message on crop insurance with the statement: "May I repeat what I have suggested in a former message: That because economic and social reforms of this character are essentially national in scope and in administration, the citizens of our nation believe that our form of government was never intended to prohibit their accomplishment."

STATE
PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18.—(AP)—An unexpected armistice ruled Portland's strike front today with the abrupt adjournment of the national labor relations board hearing into the labor dispute between the Oregon Worsted company and the textile union. Dr. Towne Nylander, trial examiner from Los Angeles, recessed the hearing late yesterday until March 22. The delay will give the factions an opportunity to renew attempts to settle the controversy without further litigation. Roy T. Bishop, president of the company, told the examiner he is desirous of complying with the law and that he is willing to deal with a qualified collective bargaining agency.

TOLEDO, Ore., Feb. 18.—(AP)—Frank Arthur of Newport suffered serious head injuries yesterday when his car crashed with an automobile driven by R. D. Watson of Eugene, West Coast Lumbermen's association inspector, at their employ of the West Coast Power company, was inspecting lines for possible damage from trees blown down in the storm.

ASTORIA, Ore., Feb. 18.—(AP)—A gale at the mouth of the Columbia river tore a Westport Lumber company barge from its moorings here yesterday. The craft, loaded with 222,000 board feet, has not been sighted. Mariners believe the wind blew it upstream. No one was aboard.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18.—(AP)—Oregon fruit got a boost in the Feltre disaster. One sailor returned to Portland with only the clothes he wore but with a box of Oregon canned fruits under his arm.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18.—(AP)—Seventy-five members of the Pisgah Home colony, west of Scappoose, were still reported snowbound today while other sections watched the January snow blanket disappear. W. N. Rose, manager of the home, said he had arranged with Art Whitaker, Portland pilot, to drop food to the colony from a plane. Rose reported insufficient food to last out the week.

SNOW HALTS RIVER RISE AFTER RAINS

High mark of the season, Thursday morning, registering 5.1 feet. It is the first time since Feb. 23, 1933, that the river has gone beyond the five-foot mark. With the rain turning to snow and freezing temperatures setting in, the river was not expected to go higher during the day, and through Thursday remained steady around 5.2 feet, the weather office said. The previous high mark for the river here this season was 4.8 feet. Salem reported flood conditions were not expected. Floor stage here is 12 feet. A near record snow fall was reported from Cascade summit. A total of 103 inches of snow lies on the ground there now, 18 inches of it new within a 24-hour period ending Thursday morning. The minimum for the day there dropped to 17 above. It was snowing lightly there during Thursday and a strong northwest wind was blowing. Train travel was not interrupted by the new snowfall, the rotary plow working during the night.

Wind Drops On Coast:
The coast guard at Florence reported a let-up in the wind and rain, for that section. The wind had dropped down to around 13 miles velocity. The day's minimum temperature was 40.

Through the Blachly and Triangle lake section, new snow fell during the night, bringing the total up to around 16 inches in the Blachly area and some 10 to 12 inches around Triangle lake. McKenzie Bridge, where 1.45 inches of rain fell from 5 p. m. Tuesday to 5 p. m. Wednesday, most of it coming down Wednesday, reported two inches of new snow, Thursday, bringing the total to nearly 30 inches.

Oakridge had new snow, Thursday, too, and several inches lie on the ground there now. Lumbermen and the county road officials watched the new storm breaking with apprehension. The deep snow and lower temperatures have held up logging and sawmill operations for some time; while the recent hard freeze and heavy snow did a great amount of damage to roads throughout the county, and with no let-up in stormy conditions little has been done in fixing up the roads.

Improvements on deeded or patented lands, \$1,827,205; town and city lots, \$5,500,010; value of improvements on town and city lots, value of \$7,943,885; improvements on lands not deeded or patented, \$116,555; logging roads and rolling stock, \$91,387; value of steamboats, stationary engines, and manufacturing machinery, valued at \$1,023,206; merchandise and stock in trade, value, \$1,190,305; farming implements, etc., value of \$144,605; money and accounts, \$10,850; value of horses and cattle, totaling 3206, valued at \$121,595; cattle, totaling 18,162, valued at \$341,565; sheep, total, 23,815, valued at \$48,790; goats, totaling 10,927, valued at \$13,430; swine, totaling 2343, valued at \$16,830; dogs and foxes, total, 488, valued at \$6605; poultry, total, \$103,234, valued at \$49,265; bees, total 917, valued at \$1610.

SALEM, Feb. 18.—(AP)—Pending the governor's signature counties will be granted \$400,000 additional revenues from the state highway department fund, in accordance with the provisions of a senate bill which passed the house yesterday. This additional amount will increase the counties' share of the revenues from \$1,600,000 to \$2,000,000 annually.

COQUILLE, Feb. 18.—(AP)—The United States engineers' requirements for a 50-foot clearance, handed the proposed Coos river bridge to replace the Landrith and Daniels creek ferries a set-back today. The county had budgeted \$35,000 for a 31-foot bridge. County Judge Hugh McLean said the higher span would cost twice as much.

CROP INSURANCE PROGRAM STARTED

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of experience in applying the principles of crop insurance.

The committee of federal officials who planned the insurance program told Mr. Roosevelt it was "too large an undertaking for private companies."

Estimating that more than \$600,000,000 in federal funds had been expended in the last 10 years for distressed farmers who lost crops, the insurance committee said much of this would be eliminated by "assisting wheat farmers to assist themselves."

It suggested the insurance plan be voluntary but that participating farmers be urged to join in other federal farm programs.

The committee said that if the insurance plan had operated in important wheat states the last six years, the greatest deficit any one time would have been 70,000,000 bushels under premiums and the greatest surplus, 70,000,000 bushels.

Federal officials estimated that \$100,000,000 to \$150,000,000 would be needed to set up the plan and establish adequate reserves and pay necessary costs.

the secretary of state. The report, he says, is not itemized. Officials of the party committees, claiming it is not necessary to file these reports, caused Mr. Johnson to write to the state attorney general for an opinion on the meaning of the law on this matter. This opinion, written by I. H. Van Winkle, is now in the possession of Johnson and expresses the view that there is no "specific language which requires such committees to file reports of their receipts and disbursements with any public officer."

Stating that he found it general practice for such committees to file reports with the secretary of state, Attorney General Van Winkle said that "on the whole, it seems quite evident that an amendment of said section 38-2412, clarifying its terms, would be very desirable."

It is to seek this clarification, Johnson said, that he planned to file his complaint in order to obtain a court opinion on the matter. He said he hopes to be able to seek a clarifying amendment during the present session of the state assembly.

District Attorney Ray's position in the matter, as outlined in a letter to County Clerk W. B. Dillard, is that he found insufficient evidence to warrant filing any complaint. He stated, however, that if Johnson wished to appear before the grand jury and the grand jury indicted anyone, he would prosecute. In a statement Thursday, Ray said:

"The letter speaks for itself. I have no further comment to make. Other than to say that I do not conceive it to be the duty of the district attorney to spend tax money in the institution of prosecutions of technical statutory violations which have been committed without any wrongful intent; from which no harm has resulted to anyone; and the prosecution of which would not result in conviction. I do not believe the district attorney's office should assume any different attitude toward the enforcement of the corrupt practice act than toward the enforcement of any other law."

"I am not satisfied with that procedure," Johnson said, in referring to Ray's answer. "I believe what is needed is a court decision on the meaning of the law regarding filing expense accounts. Then we can proceed more intelligently to write a clarifying amendment to the law."

As an example of the looseness of the state law regarding filing accounts, the attorney general pointed out that while the word "person," as used in the act, was explained, to mean a candidate or candidates, whereas the word "persons," as used in the act, is not explained. It is this fact that muddles up the law, Johnson says. If the word "persons" should be construed to mean such groups as county committees, it would be necessary for them to file accounts. However, the distinction is not made, leaving the law lax on that matter.

Johnson claims that many reports filed do not give itemized accounts of the sources of revenue spent, which he claims should be done in accordance with the law. As an example, he quoted a statement of the Taxpayers Protective Committee, Earl V. Lively, treasurer, filing an account of \$9,234 spent in opposition to the state bank bill. The source according to the report, was the Oregon Bankers' association, but individual contributions are not itemized. Johnson claims this is required by law and wishes to have that section clarified.

Forest Officials Will Attend Fire Meeting

Roy Elliott, acting supervisor of the Willamette forest, and Roy Garwood, fire assistant supervisor of the Siuslaw forest, will go to Portland Feb. 22 to attend a 12-day conference on fire control methods it was announced Thursday. Fire control assistants from 20 Oregon and Washington national forest areas will be present at the meeting. The past year's experience will be reviewed, and the training of fire guards, schooling of overhead employees for fire suppression, use of weather forecasts and other phases of the work will be discussed. The conference will run from Feb. 23 to March 6.
