CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 20.—(AP)—The University of Oregon won its third straight basketball victory from Oregon State college tonight 33 to 26.

Oregon hit them, Oregon State couldn't—that was the whole story. Oregon netted 12 in 48 shots. The Staters only five out of 47. Out of 20 tries in the first half Oregon State made one, while Oregon collected six out of 26 attempts.

The rougher end saw four Oregon and two Staters out on personal fouls. The Staters started a belated rally when Kebbie and Meryman suddenly found the hoop three times in a quick succession five minutes before the whistle but their drive died.

Both teams used the zone system. Gale, replacing Wintersteine for Oregon, took scoring honors with nine points, all scored in the last half. Oregon took an early five-point lead, but the score was tied twice in the first half. Shortly after the half, the Staters closed the gap to within two points, and then went scoreless for ten minutes.

WILLAMETTE BEATS WHITMAN, 38 TO 34

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 20.—(AP)—Willamette university spiked a northwest conference basketball championship here tonight as its hoop team overcame a driving bunch of missionaries from Whitman college 38 to 34 to sweep their championship series.

With the issue in doubt throughout a torrid second half in which the lead switched hands eight times, Harry Mosher, substitute forward guard, put Willamette four points to the good in the last minute of play with a long howitzer shot and Jerry Gastineau, high-scoring forward, dropped in a jumper to match Peplin's field goal with 15 seconds to go.

Willamette's 7 to 2 lead after six minutes of the first half were gone as the biggest lead either team gained until Willamette got ahead 85 to 32 in the last minute as they marched court for goal throughout the game. Willamette's edge was in the accuracy of its field goal shooting where it collected 17 to Whitman's 13. Gastineau and Bill Anton were the apex of the Willamette attack, each tossing in six field goals. Willamette took advantage of Whitman's cast-off style of play to get possession of the ball even when losing the tip-off much of the time.

The accurate shooting of Larry Porter, Whitman guard, from any range was a menace to the Beavers as he rolled up 12 points.

GOULD AIMS BLAST AT GARDEN HEADS

CHICAGO, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Little Joe Gould, manager of heavy-weight champion James J. Braddock, drove some new verbal punches at Madison Square Garden today and then went humming about the business of going ready for champion Jimmie the bout here next June with challenger Joe Louis.

Braddock and the brown bomber signed yesterday to go 15 rounds the night of June 22 at Comiskey Park, home of the Chicago White Sox. As scores of cameras clicked, Braddock agreed to take a \$500,000 guarantee or 50 per cent of the gate receipts and Louise 17 1/2 per cent.

At the moment, nothing was mentioned about the legal action threatened by Madison Square Garden corporation, which holds a contract calling for Braddock to meet Max Schmeling June 3 in New York. But Gould, preparing to look into offers for training quarters and consider other details in connection with the bout, was in top form today.

"What kind of an injunction they going to get on what?" he shrilled when told the Garden hinted it would go after an order to block the Chicago contest. "Here's an angle. If the Garden isn't just looking for publicity and are serious about this why didn't they have an attorney?"

"We're ready to go through with the Schmeling fight June 3. Sure we are. This bout with Louis is 10 days after June 3. So what?"

Webfoot Cagers To Meet Gonzaga Quint Here Monday Night

Oregon's galloping Webfoots will take on a tough non-conference opponent in Gonzaga university Monday night at McArthur court in a "special added attraction" to the winter's league program. The contest will start at 8 o'clock.

Marking the initial appearance of a Gonzaga five at McArthur court, Monday night's game will be the first non-conference tilt slated during the season in many years. The Bulldogs wind up a brief Oregon invasion here.

Len Yandle, former Southern Oregon Normal school star under Oregon's Howard Hobson, is the peacemaker of the Gonzaga quint. Rated as one of the finest shots on the coast, Yandle has averaged well over 15 points per game this season. Henry Haug, diminutive guard, is another scoring artist.

The Bulldogs employ a versatile defense, shifting from man to man to zone as the occasion demands. Gonzaga has made tough going for all competition this year, losing only to Washington State and Cheney Normal. Victories have been scored over Montana State college, Montana State Normal, and the University of Montana.

Oregon will feature its regular lineup against the Bulldogs, according to Coach Hobson. Dave Silvers and John Lewis will open at the forward posts, Slim Wintermute at center, and Bob Anet and Wally Johansen, forwards.

No reserved seats will be sold for the contest.

Idaho Policemen Watch Mountain Lions Drive Elk

POCATELLO, Idaho, Feb. 19.—(AP)—A police officer told today of watching, from his beat in downtown Pocatello, three mountain lions stampede a herd of 300 elk and cut out two of the animals for a kill.

Three other policemen corroborated the account, saying they watched the stampede on Kinport park, five miles from town, through field-glasses. Game Warden L. A. Lehrbas set out for the park to investigate.

Officer Riley Dixon spotted the animals while walking his beat. "Three hundred elk or so were grazing on a slope," he said. "Three other officers and I watched them with glasses."

"Suddenly three mountain lions appeared. The elk became all panicky and stampeded every way across the hills. The last we could see, the lions were chasing two elk off down toward a creek."

Lehrbas expressed skepticism the men could determine, even through powerful glasses, whether the smaller animals were lions, dogs, coyotes or even elk calves.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 20.—(AP)—On paper the 1937 Oakland baseball club does not shape up as strong as last year's entry, which for a time led the coast league races, and finished in the runner-up position.

Manager Bill Meyer, at this writing, needs a couple of pitchers, a catcher and one outfielder. The Oaks, which have a strong tie-in with the New York Yankees, undoubtedly will get the necessary help from the last world's series champs.

Making up the flinging corps will be Willie Ludolph, league leader last season with 21 wins and six losses; Ken Douglas, Hal Hall and Floyd Olds, Bruce Cunningham and youngsters Bob Miller, Earl Archart, Phil Gugich, Marcel Serventi, Jim Paul, Ralph Hammer, and Marvin Brewer.

Trying Comeback
Cunningham, former big leaguer, is trying to comeback after two years' absence due to a weak arm. Brewer looms as the best of the recruits, having won 18 and lost nine for Birmingham of the New York-Penn league last season.

The only seasoned catcher on tab is Bill Haimondi, who had trials with the Yankees and Cincinnati last year before retiring with a sore arm.

'TEAM WRESTLING' SCHEDULED HERE

Promoter Herb Owen, who invented the wrestling "battle royal" and the one-night mat tournament, has evolved another grappling gigantic, and Lane county tussle-and-grunt fans will get their first look at it next Thursday night.

Owen's main event, this week will pit Fritz Ludwig and Jack Lipscomb against Herb Parks and Ben Sherman in a "team wrestling" match, best two out of three falls.

"I presented a team match in Portland last week," Owen said Saturday, "and it proved the most sensational mat attraction I have ever staged. Local fans will find it beats even battle royals for thrills!"

Under the rules of "team wrestling," the four grapplers enter the ring, two on a side, and go to it until both members of one team have been downed. This constitutes a fall.

After a rest period, they return for the second fall, and if necessary for the third. As in battle royal, anything goes, and when one member of a team has been eliminated, the remaining partner must battle the two men instead of one.

Owen plans to have a stand-out supporting card. Further details on the team battle will be announced early this week.

VAROFF'S RECORD TIED BY MEADOWS

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—(AP)—The annual New York Athletic club indoor track and field carnival produced one new world record tonight for the benefit of a crowd of 10,000 fans at Madison Square Garden.

Fleet-footed Eddie O'Brien, Syracuse university Olympian, hung up a new indoor standard of 37.6 seconds, clipping two-tenths off his own mark made in last year's meet, as he raced off with the Buermeier 500-yard special. O'Brien made his first victory of the 1937 board campaign a notable one by handing his negro rival, Jimmy Hebert of New York university the latter's first setback.

Earle Meadows of Southern California, the Olympic champion, missed the indoor pole vault record by a fraction of an inch. He cleared the bar at what he and the crowd thought was 14 feet 5 inches for a new mark, only to find on re-measurement that the bar was actually 14 feet, 4 3/4 inches from the floor. This was under the record of 14 feet, 4 1/2 inches made by George Varoff of Oregon last week.

Don Lash, the sensational Indiana iron-man, topped off the foot-racing which by capturing the two-mile from an all-star field in 9:31.6, just a week after he lowered the indoor record to 8:55 at Boston. Lash won by ten yards from his teammate, Tommy Deckard.

Maxie Baer Arrives For New York Bout

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Max Baer arrived today from California, anxious to get down to serious training to launch a campaign which he hopes will carry him back to the heavyweight heights again.

The giant Baer, weighing 216 pounds, arrived in tow of his little manager, Anil Hoffman, who immediately set out looking for a training camp somewhere in the suburbs "away from the night clubs."
