SPRINGFIELD, Feb. 20.—(Special)—The Youth League is meeting Tuesday night at armory for the regular bi-monthly social. There will be a surprise program and copies of the Youth League paper will be distributed. According to George C. Berreman, League executive, a great deal of work has been done on the paper, advertising has been solicited, and the group is turning a mimeographed news sheet carrying announcements of Youth League activities.

On Thursday night, there will be the regular class night meeting, when all the groups of the Youth League hold class instruction. A new class in chess and checker playing has been organized and has a wide interest among the members. Mr. Berreman reports that much interest is being shown in the tap dancing class under the direction of Paul Rix, student at the university.
