### CANADIANS EMBARK TO JOIN LOYALISTS

Activities For Grove Folk Given

VANCOUVER, B. C., Feb. 20.—(CP)—The Vancouver Daily Province in a newspaper story Friday said that Royal Canadian mounted police, investigating reports that 25 Vancouver men have left Vancouver recently to enlist with Spanish government forces, may take steps to prevent the party's sailing from New York.

The paper continues: "Many of the volunteers, it is stated, were on relief in Vancouver. Several are well known in left-wing circles."

"More than half the party traveled via Seattle by bus because it was feared that legislation now pending in Ottawa might prevent their departure from Canada. The rest left by boat, some working their passage to Europe."

"Thirteen of the adventurers are avowed communists and the remainder a group of Russians, Greeks, Serbians and one or two from other Balkan countries."

"Thirteen of the group," the Province said, "are traveling together and expect to board the same ship from New York next week."

No confirmation was obtainable from official sources in Vancouver that a group of men had left the city to enlist in Spanish government forces. The Royal Canadian mounted police in Vancouver said they were not investigating departure of men for Spain.

### NO Elaborate Forms Needed For Social Security Information

No special office forms or elaborate record-keeping systems are prescribed for furnishing the information necessary under the federal old-age benefit plan, according to an announcement received today from the social security board by Ben O. Lipscomb, field representative of the board in Eugene.

The board declared that present payroll records of most firms can be adjusted so as to include the required information, without the necessity of purchasing additional record systems.

According to advice from the collector of internal revenue, employers' taxes under the social security act for the month of January, 1937, including the amount of tax withheld from employees' remuneration for that month, were due and payable on February 1. The necessity for immediate reporting and remittance was emphasized, as these taxes will become delinquent on March 2 and a penalty will accrue for failure to remit within the specified time.
