

MUSIC'S PLACE FOR 'AVERAGE' MAN DISCUSSED

In his 23 years residence in Eugene, Dean John J. Landsbury of the University of Oregon school of music said he believed his appearance at Kiwanis, Monday noon, was the first time he had been invited by a civic group here to speak on the subject of music—although he had been associated with the subject of music for 50 years. His topic for the Kiwanians was: "Music for the Non-Existent Average Man."

Regarding music for the "average" man, people are divided into two classifications—listeners or hearers, and secondly, the producers of music, the dean commented. A distinction is made between listeners and hearers and it must be confessed that today the general public is made up more of hearers than listeners, he added.

A revival is needed for an interest in music by the "average" man today to ward off the commercialism that has taken hold in the field of music, the speaker said. He pointed out he had no quarrel with commercialism but that the development of radio has made a world of listeners and hearers in music rather than one of doers. He mentioned the Eugene Glee-men chorus particularly as a group to commend, not only because of the beautiful music sung but because its membership is made up of men from other fields "who use music as a refreshment."

Commenting on a definition for music, Dean Landsbury said he had given considerable study to the matter and had written out 112 definitions. After all, there is music for every man after his own taste, he said. Music has two parts: its substance is scientific, its superstructure, interpretation or the artistic, he commented, and went on to briefly discuss the place of rhythm as the order in music, melody, harmony, etc. Rhythm is not peculiar to music in that it is order. Melody is peculiar to music in that it deals with tone, yet we can not agree on definitions for it, he went on to explain.

In conclusion, he touched upon music for children, pointing out they are the citizens of tomorrow and in developing their interests comes the matter of what music can and should mean in our life.

The speaker was introduced by Orlando J. Hollis. Guests at the luncheon were Dr. Horace Westwood of Berkeley, Cal., Rev. Herbert Huggins, Dr. Henry H. Norton, and Anson Cornell of the university.

It was hoped to bring it up in the senate for debate this week. There was long discussion over consideration of Mr. Roosevelt's full program which includes his request for authority to increase the size of the supreme court if justices now over 70 do not retire. At the end it was decided to start hearings early next month.

Hearings in March
Chairman Ashurst (D-Ariz.) said he made the motion to begin hearings March 9. King, an opponent of the president's plan, moved to start March 15, but his motion was defeated. The committee also defeated a motion by Senator McCarran (D-Nev.) to begin March 21.

The committee chairman said he felt Attorney General Cummings should be the first witness. No suggestion was made at the meeting today, he said, that justices of the supreme court should be called.

The hearings will be held before the full committee, rather than a subcommittee. Senator Van Nuys (D-Cal.), one of the leading opponents of the court plan, gave notice, Ashurst said, that "at the proper time" he would move to divide the bill so that the plan for increasing the supreme court membership could be considered separately.

Some senators have expressed the opinion that enactment of the Sumner voluntary retirement measure might result in one or two withdrawals from the high tribunal and ease the tension over the court issue.

Sensors who have not yet committed themselves still held the balance of power. Senator Nye (R-Iowa) came out last night against the program, bringing the number of announced opponents to 32. Senator Green (D-Ill.) at the same time expressed support, bringing to 31 those who have publicly favored it.

Has Narrow Escape

"Suddenly somebody shouted 'Look out!' I ran but I thought I was caught. The air was full of fine, powdery snow. The noise was terrific as I ran, half-blinded, toward the train."

"I want to tell you, mister, I think I'm the luckiest man alive." Railroad officials said it would take three or four days to clear the tracks and rebuild the trestle.

Four separate slides, none causing damage, occurred on the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul & Pacific tracks near the summit of the Cascades, delaying trains seven or eight hours.

All were caused by warm rains which fell over the northwest yesterday. More than 50 skiers at Paradise Valley, Rainier national park, were prevented from reaching their automobiles at Narada Falls by highway when slides covered it. Park officials ordered snow plow crews to work on 24-hour shifts.

At 9 a. m. park officials said trails to Paradise were re-opened, allowing marooned skiers to hike out to Longmire, 12 miles away. The Longmire-Narada highway remained hopelessly blocked, and officials have no hope automobiles stalled at Narada would be freed for two or three days.

Skiing Ended
Fog at Paradise and rain at Longmire virtually ended skiing today.

Snoqualmie pass, blocked Saturday night, was reopened yesterday but chains were advised. Blewett pass was closed for a few hours yesterday, and was closed again today by fresh slides.

The state highway department also reported the Stevens pass road closed today by slides near Skykomish, below where the Great Northern tracks were cut.

The Mount Baker highway was blocked at Glacier but was to be opened to Shuksan late today. Communications with Mount Rainier were cut off today.

The weather bureau in Seattle reported precipitation already has broken February records of the past 20 years.

MINIATURE TOWN IS BUILT BY STUDENTS
DES MOINES, Iowa.—Pupils of the public and parochial schools of this city will compete in a miniature-house contest. The models will be assembled in a "Tiny Town" display at the National Home Show to be held under the sponsorship of the Des Moines members of the Iowa Retail Lumbermen's association and the endorsement of the Federal Housing Administration.

The contest, under the supervision of J. C. Woolman, director of industrial education in the city schools, will be divided into three classes. "April Romance" to Be Shown With Film Depicting Man's Rise

"The Human Adventure," an eight-reel educational picture of man's rise to civilization, is being co-sponsored with "April Romance," a picture of the early love of Franz Schubert, the great musician, at the Rex theatre Wednesday afternoon and evening.

Dr. L. S. Cressman, head of the anthropology department of the university, has been instrumental in bringing this picture to Eugene. The authenticity of the picture is assured since it was under the scientific direction of Dr. James Henry Breasted, noted historian, archaeologist and director of the Oriental Institute of the University of Chicago.

The picture starts with a sphere floating to the center of the screen which is supposed to represent the formation of the earth as a fiery ball of fluid rock. From this point a 9,000 mile journey covers what Dr. Breasted has named "The Fertile Crescent."

"April Romance" starring Richard Tauber, the internationally famous tenor and Jane Baxter, leading English cinema star, completes this bill being shown under the auspices of the university. "April Romance" is being sponsored by the school of music. From a recent review of the picture Dean John L. Landsbury said, "I am happy to be able to recommend this picture to all the music lovers of Eugene and the university. This is one of the finest musical pictures I have ever seen produced."

Tickets for the special students matinee are on sale in the high schools and the Rex theatre. The evening tickets may be obtained at the box office of the Rex or at the University Co-op.

ETHIO CHIEFTAINS TO FACE FIRING SQUAD

ADDIS ABABA, Feb. 22.—(AP)—All Ethiopians connected with the attempted assassination of Viceroy Rodolfo Graziani will be shot by an Italian firing squad on direct orders from Premier Mussolini, colonial officers announced today.

A second series of instructions from Il Duce decreed death for all native chieftains continuing opposition to the Italian government, they declared.

Reprisals for the wounding of Viceroy Graziani and several others during a celebration Friday will be "extensive and summary," the fascist commanders said.

The viceroy, the Abuna Cyril, Coptic bishop of Ethiopia, and Aviation General Aurelio Liotta, were wounded when Ethiopians tossed hand grenades in the midst of the official party at a festival honoring the birth of king-emperor Vittorio Emanuele's grandson.

"The same punishment will go beyond ordinary reprisals," the officers said, "to obtain a demonstration the new conqueror will not stand for opposition."

Dispatch riders from the lake region south of Addis Ababa arrived in the capital with news that all Ethiopian chieftains captured in a pitched battle Saturday had been killed. The Ethiopian leader, Gabra Mariam, was killed during the fighting.

Eugene Businessmen Start Conditioning In New Men's Gym

Eugene businessmen will have their first chance to enjoy the facilities of the University of Oregon's new men's gymnasium tonight when the first businessmen's physical education classes are held. The opening classes will be held from 7:30 to 9:30 o'clock.

Efforts to secure permission to have adult gym classes in the university plant were successful last week, and a drive to secure enough members to make the plan work was started. Immediate response from a number of Eugeneans assured the idea success, and tonight more than 40 men will turn out to try and run, work, and play off a few of the excess pounds that have gathered while they wait in office chairs.

Joe Darby, who arranged all details with the university as envoy from the junior chamber of commerce, said that more than 40 men had called him, and that many more were anxious to join the classes spring term. Special arrangements with the university make it possible to use all facilities of the new gymnasium, with gym clothes and towels thrown in, for \$4 per term. A special rate of \$2 was made for the rest of this winter term, which ends March 13.

Members of the classes need only supply their own gym shoes. Registration for the winter term activities will be held tonight, in the gymnasium.
