McKevitt; Hendricks-Hayden Bridge sections on McKenzie, J. B. Endicott, J. N. Hill; Hayden Bridge-Coburg Bridge section on McKenzie, S. Y. Bartholomew; Coburg bridge to mouth of McKenzie section, W. Nine Points Listed
In his message to these delegations, Mr. Maxey stated: "We must show a positive and insistent demand on the part of everybody concerned for the carrying out of the development. The following nine points have been suggested for the Lane county briefs: (1) Tell who you or your organization are, what community you represent, where it is located, and what section of the river affects your district. (2) Tell the approximate population of your community, the kind of crops raised, the number of farms and number of acres covered by flood. (3) Describe the flood damages in your community during the last twenty years. (4) What are the threatened flood damages in the future and what do you think can be done to prevent or lessen the damage. (5) What, if any, has been done to protect the land from flood damages in your community either by individuals, corporations, county, state or federal government. (6) If the government should undertake bank protection or reclamation work on your part of river, do you think the land owners would furnish reasonable rights-of-way along the river and across land in order to carry on the project. (7) In your opinion, would the land owners sign waivers to relieve the government from ordinary damage claims occurring while construction work is going on. (8) Would your community be willing to cooperate with the county or state in undertaking the upkeep expense on the bank reclamation, if substantially built. (9) Give any other pertinent facts or conditions of the river in your locality that you think will help show the need for protection or development."

tradition Olen saying that the measure does not raise the property levy in any way.

"It merely sets the amount to be appropriated from the state at the 1930 level. It would not change the amount levied on the people through the educational millage levy in any way whatsoever," Hyde explained.

Support Is Low
Hyde said that the schools were operating under increasing burdens of growing enrollments and costs, that the amounts granted for their support were among the lowest in the nation.

"We should make our schools something to be proud of," he stated. He pointed out that not only the instructors at the school whom he said, were receiving salaries which averaged among the lowest in the state schools of the nation, but that "the laboring people on the college campuses are going to get a new deal and a square break under this measure."

Representative Ronald Jones, Marion, said to one legislator that he wished he had brought in a minority report against passage of the bill in its present form.

"I believe we would have beat you," he said.

Representatives George Friede and F. Hosch spoke in favor of the bill, stressing the need of education, any peining the work being done in Oregon schools "under the hardships they are forced to endure."

With the single exception of Representative R. P. Laird, all representatives from counties having one of the state schools voted for passage of the measure. Laird said he wished the bill be referred to committee.

Those voting against the bill appropriating money for higher education were: Representatives: Allen, Brady, Duess, Eason, Fisher, Harrison, Jensen, Jennings, Jones, Laird, Leach, Mahoney, Martin, Miller, Olen, Riddle, Roth, Turner, Wagner, and Young.

ANTI-STRIKE BILL DOOMED BY ACTION

would open up new markets for Oregon products.

Senator Dean Walker, Independence, termed the bill a direct blow at the development of the resources of the state.

"This attacks the very policy which I believe is the foundation of our future prosperity," Walker said. "We must create more wealth in this state, and the office works toward that end."

In the house, with Willis Mahoney, Klamath Falls, and candidate for United States senator last fall, on hand to supervise the "liberal bloc," the passage of appropriation bills took up most of the session.

Demanding the reduction of the age limit on old-age pensions, the "independents" awaited the appearance in the house of reports from the ways and means committee on the social security bill. The measure set the age limit to 70 years, and the maximum benefits at \$30 a month. A majority report favoring the bill as it stood, and a minority report seeking more liberal pensions, were expected today.

The labor "registration" bill, one of the most controversial of the labor bills brought in during this session of the legislature, was sent into the labor and industries committee today.

During the past ten days, the bill had been taken from the labor and industries committee, sent to the administration and reorganization committee, and the substitute brought out on the floor.

The house military affairs committee introduced a bill in the house providing for the establishment of a state soldier's home, probably in Roseburg, appropriating \$50,000 for the project.
