

STRIKES HARASSING NATION'S INDUSTRY

Officials to see two Chrysler officials in Detroit.

An estimated 300 to 500 employees of the Timken Detroit Axle company were sitting down.

The Crowell Publishing company's presses were stopped by a sit-down strike of 800 pressmen who avowed a determination to maintain their position "until Christmas if necessary."

The New England shoe strikes were called by the United Shoe and Leather Workers' union, and provided the "first test in this section of the strength of a C. I. O. affiliate. Some observers anticipated early settlement, pointing to the fact that 17 manufacturers employing 8,000 of the union's 17,000 members had acceded to demands and additional negotiations were scheduled.

The Electric Boat company at Groton, Conn., resumed what company spokesmen termed "capacity production" on government submarine contracts. State police forcibly evicted 108 strikers on warrants charging them with trespassing. The company said its full force, excepting the strikers, had returned to work. Performance picketing this morning dwindled away.

PLANT IS HELD

SANTA MONICA, Cal., Feb. 24.—(AP)—Two hundred sit-down strikers held the vast Douglas aircraft plant today in defiance of a company warning that "serious consequences" might follow further delay of work on army airplane contracts totaling \$19,000,000.

The strikers, taking turn sleeping and standing guard in the plant, jeered when the warning of President Donald Douglas was read and tore down a wooden partition around two partly completed army bombers so that they could prevent any attempt to complete them.

MRS. GARNER ILL

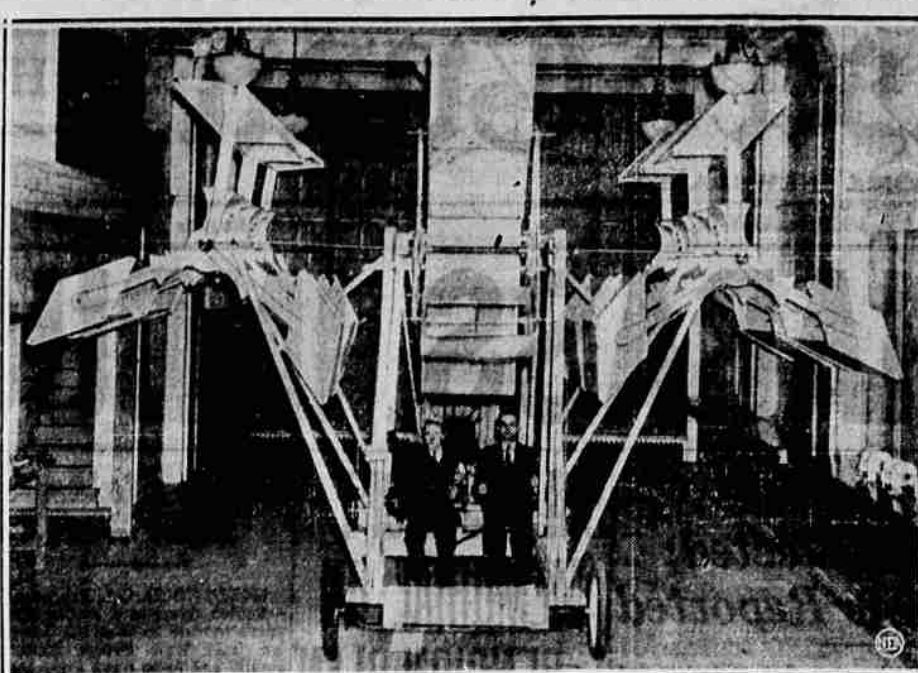

Grants Pass Grade School is Burned; Loss Over \$50,000

GRANTS PASS, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Fire sweeping from the basement through a paper chute to the upper floor almost completely destroyed the 34-year-old Riverside school here last night. Replacement loss was variously estimated as high as \$53,000.

Appraised value in 1934, before improvements were made, was \$44,537. Superintendent M. B. Winslow said insurance totaled approximately \$20,000.

The school's 258 students in the six lower grades were directed to other of the four remaining schools today, but it was believed additional space would be necessary since the administration earlier had reported the buildings were overcrowded.

Bursting hose twice hampered firemen in combating the flames, first noticed at about six o'clock. No one was in the building. Not until 9:30 was the fire controlled.

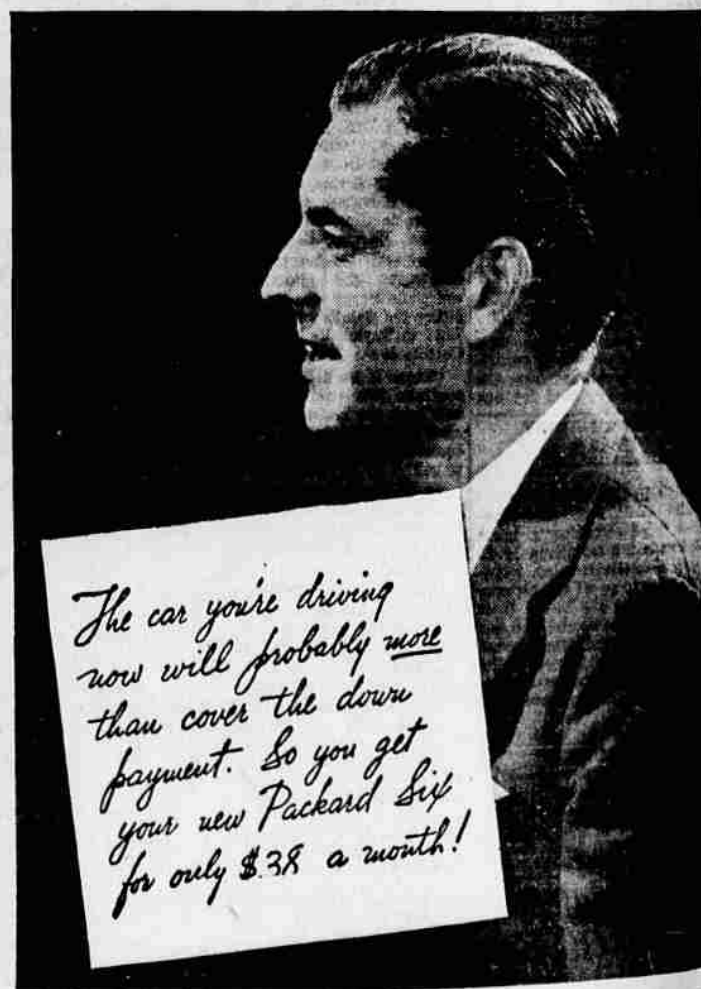
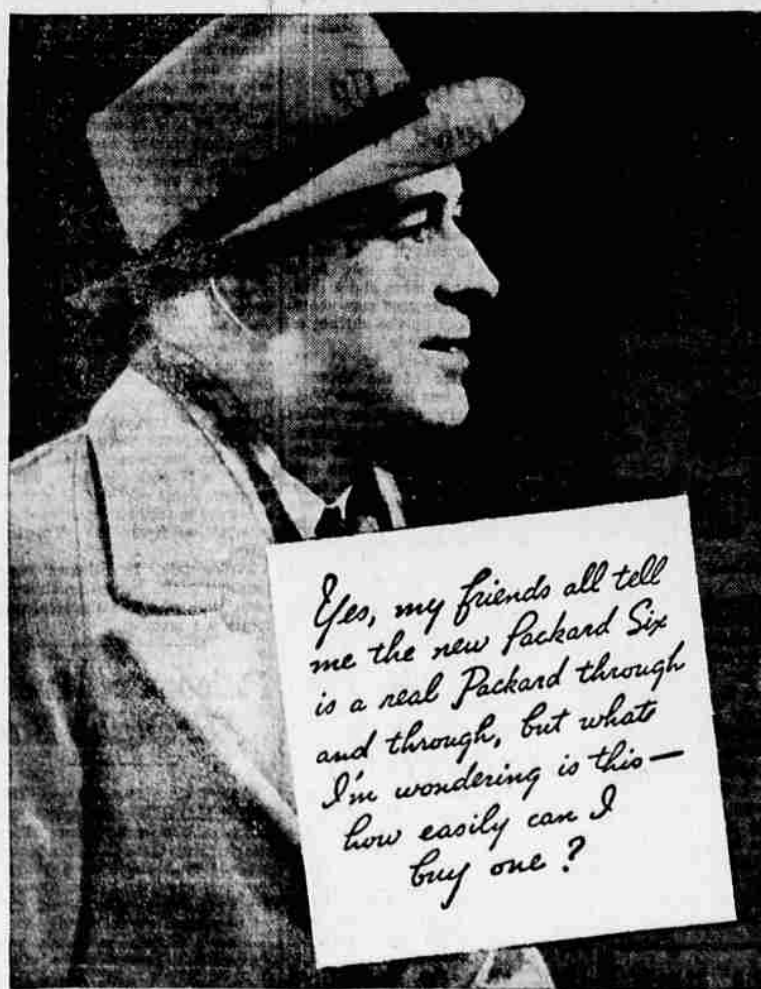
