"SLALOM" TO SHOW AT REX THEATRE FRIDAY, SATURDAY

What promises to be one of the most thrilling outdoor pictures ever to show in Eugene has been booked for the Rex theatre Friday and Saturday. It is "Slalom," a European production devoted to skiing, skating and sledding—and featuring three of the world's best skiers. The local showing is being sponsored by the Osburn Ski club in cooperation with James O'Connell, manager of the McDonald and Rex theatres.

The film has only been released in the United States within the past few weeks, and those who have viewed it already predict it will draw capacity crowds during its showing here. Here is what the Boston "Globe" theatre reviewer had to say about it, after its initial performance in Boston:

"Slalom," with Guzzi Lantschner, Walter Rini and Hella Harewich as the leading players, is by far the most magnificent film portrayal of the art of skiing which has yet come to Boston. It ought to pack the Fine Arts Theatre with winter sports enthusiasts who can watch to their hearts' content telemarks, christians and all the more difficult stunts of skiers done by Europe's most expert sportsmen.

It is true that there isn't much acting in "Slalom." The various characters are never off their skis, except when they put on skates. But there is a romance for good measure and the heroine becomes angry when her fiancé, who is a police officer, is killed by a car. She goes out and proves herself the ski champion of the world and her fiancé returns to her. They go away off on skis with her wedding veil trailing behind. All the conquered ski rivals, wearing dress suits and skis, throw snowballs at them.

"What caused the gasps and the cheers of yesterday's unexpectedly large audience was the impressive exhibition of skiing. There were remarkable stunts done by the two principal comedians, who are actors as well as winter athletes. They slid down rocky mountains, they jumped over half hidden fences, they raced trains, and they were chased in Mack Bennett fashion by a policeman on skis. It must take a lot of skiing knowledge to be a 'top' in the sports resorts."

"Slalom" isn't the sort of picture a movie reviewer can criticize for acting and photography—it is rather a straight sports picture and thrilling, not because of plot, but on account of some of the prettiest and most amazing 'action' that any picture ever had."

The picture is being shown in Eugene as part of a big skiing week-end. The Osburn Ski club is also sponsoring another "snow train" to Crescent Lake Sunday, and the film is being shown to give skiers some idea of how real experts look as they can see some of the stunts when they hit the "white blanket." Sunday.

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Thirty-Three Senators Now Publicly Opposed To Court-Stacking Act

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—(AP)—Senator Donahay (D-Ohio) spoke out strongly against President Roosevelt's court reorganization program after his colleague, Senator Harkley, endorsed it as an effort "to restore our form of government."

Donahay in his first public statement on the court issue said: "This entire controversy vitally affects the judiciary, a coordinate branch of the government, and should be referred to the people—the source of all political power."

The number of senators publicly opposing the chief executive's proposal remained at 33, but the list of those favoring the plan dropped to 26.

Although Donahay did not say in as many words he would vote against the president's proposal, he did say: "The constitution is the foundation of our government. The judges build the community temple and place it in our hands for safekeeping, then passed on."

"It is our solemn duty to place it in the hands of those who follow us, not of court, but political, unprincipled."

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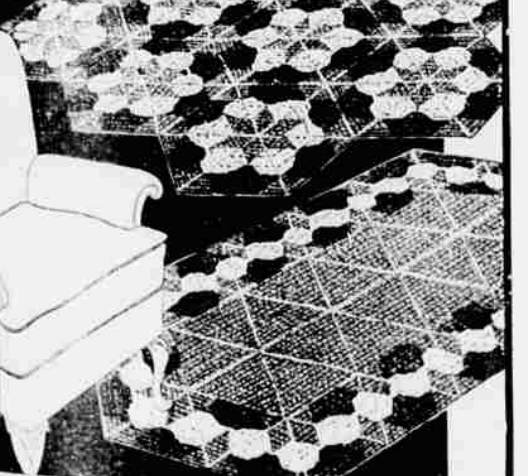
