

SOLONS AGREE ON NEW PENSION ACT

was the state building program legislation, which came up in the senate today.

The house passed a bill authorizing the board of control to purchase a building in Portland for state office purposes, at a cost not to exceed \$700,000. Having passed the house, the bill now goes to the governor.

The senate rejected a bill for licensing pinball machines and punchboards, on the majority recommendation of the committee on judiciary. The bill would have provided licenses for "amusement devices" for pinball machines using five balls or more, and for punchboards as "trade stimulants."

Governor Martin tonight vetoed the emergency clause of the bill prohibiting operation of pinball and other games of chance.

The labor registration bill appeared on the floor of the house today with a divided report, and debate on the measure was set over until Monday.

The majority report recommended against passage of the bill, while the minority report brought in several amendments to the measure that would require the registration of unions with the corporation commissioner.

The legislative ways and means committee reported today that it had approved appropriations reaching a total of \$10,851,998.

Increase in Crops Introduced By OSC Extension Is Noted

CORVALLIS, Ore., March 6.—(AP)—Agriculturist E. R. Jackson reported a marked increase during the past decade in the acreage of crops introduced by the Oregon State College extension service.

West of the Cascades, Grimm alfalfa increased in five years to 42,555 acres, from an acreage of 3,310 in 1926, his survey shows. Ladino clover increased from 234 to 16,254 acres, sweet clover from 583 to 6,175, and Austrian winter peas from 50 to 27,350.

East of the mountains, created wheat grain increased from test lot status to an acreage last year of 30,000 acres. Marked gains were on the coast; anthracnose resistant red clover, crimson clover, Ladino clover for seed, garden pea seed, English rye grass, Reed canary grass and varieties of bent grasses.

Seamen's Discharge Books Are Required

LOS ANGELES, March 6.—(AP)—The new law requiring all seamen to carry continuous discharge books will be enforced at Los Angeles harbor without delay, according to a statement today by A. L. Woodruff, United States shipping commissioner here. Woodruff said enforcement of the act would be based on the ruling yesterday by Federal Judge Albert Lee Stephens, which dissolved a temporary restraining order obtained by the union.

Seattle's Lumber Strike Is "Quiet"

TACOMA, Wash., March 6.—(AP)—Sawmill and Lumber Workers' union today called a mass meeting for tomorrow to discuss a strike of 1000 men which has tied up seven Seattle plants. Union leaders would do no more than announce the meeting. They did not say a strike was contemplated here. Conditions were quiet over the week-end in Seattle. Pickets patrolled the strike-bound mills but neither unions or operators made any moves toward a settlement.

Chelan Townsend Test Spending Is Said Unwarranted

CHELAN, Wash., March 6.—(AP)—Town elders, members of a civic committee to investigate the benefits of the \$200 "pension" spending experiments which made this community nationally known, advised today continuation of the so-called "Townsend test" is not "warranted" except with philanthropic financing aid.

The report came as Isom Lamb, originator of the "test" scheme, started for Salt Lake City to institute a Utah plan. He refused to discuss the benefits of the spending experiments before the committee yesterday because of the presence of a member whom he accused of prejudice.

The committee reported its investigation showed a total of only \$67.40 was collected here in the circulation of more than \$400 which was put into circulation by two aged recipients. Lamb had claimed the tax collections were above \$400.

UNION BOLTS AFL TO JOIN WITH CIO

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yesterday in a swiftly moving series of events on the labor front.

The United Rubber Workers of America voted to remain away from work at the Firestone Tire and Rubber company's Akron plants until the union, a CIO affiliate, was recognized as the sole collective bargaining agency for 10,000 workers, a "company union" was abolished, and negotiation upon certain demands was assured.

Chicago Taxless
Chicago was almost completely without taxi service. A strike that began unexpectedly Friday spread quickly.

Wages were raised in scattered industries. Five iron mining firms announced increases for about 10,000 wage earners in Minnesota, Northern Wisconsin and northern Michigan, which were expected to add from \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 annually to their income.

The United States Metals Refining Co. at Carteret, N. J., ordered 10-cent an hour raises for hourly workers and five percent boosts for salaried employees, affecting a total of about 1,500 wage earners.

A five percent pay hike was given workers in the Mohawk Carpet Mills, Inc., at Amsterdam, N. Y., while officials of the Bigelow-Sanford Carpet Co. there agreed to meet a CIO group next week on wage demands.

The Seeger Refrigerator Co. in St. Paul announced a ten percent wage boost for 2,000 employees aggregating about \$200,000 annually.

The Postal Telegraph Company announced it had agreed to collective bargaining with employee representatives in conferences at Washington, Philadelphia and Detroit.

About 100 blind workers held steady to their "sitdown" strike for higher pay at Pittsburgh in the face of discomfort and illness.

Heavy Slash In Relief Rolls Is Declared Averted

WASHINGTON, March 6.—(AP)—A 150,000-man slash this month in federal work relief rolls appeared tonight to have been averted by a conference between President Roosevelt and six protesting governors.

Governor Elmer A. Benson of Minnesota, one of the six who talked for three and a half hours with the president this afternoon, said the effect of the discussions would be a month's postponement of contemplated reductions.

Whether the cut should be made in April will be studied in the interim. Prior to today's conference, Harry L. Hopkins, the works progress administrator, had told a house committee that continued recovery and a good agricultural year would permit rolling 150,000 off WPA rolls in March.

White house aides reported that 181 messages had been received in response to the president's speech Thursday night, of which only 19 were unfavorable. Congressional leaders of both sides of the controversy were waiting anxiously to see how their own mail was affected.
