UPSET HUSKIES;
SCORE 36 TO 33

WASHINGTON PAVILION, Seattle, Mar. 13.—(Special).—A courageous and fighting team of Washington State College basketball players won the right to meet the University of Oregon in the northern division playoff finals sometime next week by defeating the University of Washington Huskies here Friday night by the score of 36 to 33.

The Cougars trailed the fast-stepping Husky crew through three-quarters of the game, but battled up on even terms after ten minutes of the second half and then went on to win the game. Score at halftime was Washington, 23, Washington State 14.

Nelson Stars
It was the grand game played by "Corky" Carlson, Ivor Nelson, and Capt. Bill Dahlke that finally brought the faltering Cougars up out of the hole they fell into during the first half of the game. Nelson, towering center, played one of the best games of his entire career to almost completely dominate the tip-off.

Washington opened the game with some of the fastest basketball ever seen on the pavilion floor, running the Cougars off their feet and scoring freely in the first ten minutes. The

score favored the Huskies 19 to 8 at that time. A time out for the Cougars seemed to give them added confidence, however, and they held the Huskies to two field baskets in the next ten minutes while they were picking up four.

Cougars Come Back
The second half saw an entirely different state of affairs develop. Instead of having the Washington five carry the ball game, the Cougars stepped out and did all the battling themselves. Slowly they pulled the score up until it stood at 24-21. At that point big Ed Loverich, Husky forward, potted a basket, with Jack Gannon coming through with another minute later to give the Huskies added confidence.

The Washington States were not to be denied, however, and crept slowly closer. A basket by Al Hooper tied up the score at 30-all with but seven minutes left to go in the game. Seconds later Nelson tipped in a rebound to give the Cougars the lead for the first time in the game. Loverich countered for Washington with a foul toss, and Wagner again tied up the score at 32-all with another free basket.

Game See-saws
There was four minutes still to go when Kerps, substitute Cougar forward, canned a beautiful field goal to put the States again to the fore. Loverich sank another free toss a minute later to bring the score to 34-33 for Washington State, but Hooper looped in a beautiful one-handed basket fifty seconds before the end of the game to give the Cougars a three point lead. That was the way the game ended, with Washington State winning 36 to 33.

The Cougars will entertain the University of Oregon Webfoots at Pullman in the title game of the playoff, probably next Saturday night, March 20. The Webfoots drew the playoff bye when the three schools tied for first place last Saturday night.

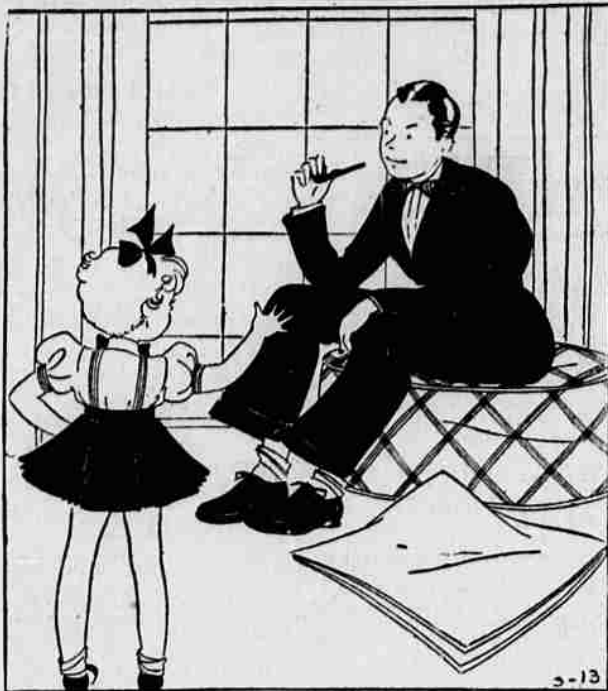

Stories in STAMPS

BRITISH dominions and other possessions are planning special stamps for the coronation of King George VI, May 12. Canada announces such a set, to be placed on sale immediately after the coronation and to be available for several weeks thereafter. Before this set appears, however, Canada expects to issue a regular series of George VI stamps.

Newfoundland will be included in the colonial issues planned in London, but will add 11 stamps of its own, making a total of 14 values.

South Africa plans a series of five pairs of stamps, in English and Afrikaans, making a total of 10. Southwest Africa will issue similar pairs in seven values, or 14 in all.

Coronation issues also will come from Southern Rhodesia, Papua, Australia, New Zealand, and other British units.

Cover collectors should prepare envelopes for first day issue of the forthcoming 4-cent army and navy stamps. Send self-addressed covers (not more than 10 for each type), with money order covering total of stamps required, to Postmaster, Washington, D. C.

Although it may be too late to arrange for covers on the first return flight of the Pan-American clipper ships between the United States and China, envelopes may be prepared for the first flights to Macao and Hongkong, scheduled to leave San Francisco about April 1.

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MIKE JACOBS IS
HOLDING TRUMPS
IN RING SET-UP

(This is the second of a series of stories on the inside workings of the boxing business, with special reference to the current heavyweight scramble.)

NEW YORK, March 13.—(AP).—They're all trying to grab the brass ring on the heavyweight merry-go-round, with Chicago, Berlin and New York rating contending positions in that order. One of the few identifiable facts is that the old colossus and cuff man, Michael Strauss Jacobs, has the next heavyweight champion of the world in his grasp.

Even if Champion Jim Braddock is kept from fighting Joe Louis in Chicago and forced to meet Max Schmeling either in New York or Berlin this summer, Mike Jacobs still will hold the strings. He has Louis and Schmeling both under contract, and has an option on Braddock's services if the champion beats Louis at Chicago.

The Garden's one and apparently remote chance of keeping any strings at all on the titles situation is to force Braddock to go through with the contract to fight Schmeling here on June 3. This the champion has not the slightest intention of doing.

Deal on Fire
Along cauliflower alley you can hear talk (a) that all this shadow boxing is preliminary to a "deal" between Jacobs and the Garden, heretofore long time allies in the ticket business; (b) that each side is fearful the other will blow the lid off certain fictitious practices, past or present, and (c) that the Garden seriously is considering "washing its hands" of the entire boxing business in disgust or disillusionment.

All direct evidence, however, indicates both the Garden and the 20th Century Sporting Club—Mike Jacobs, Inc.—intend to remain in the fistie field.

The Garden has survived intermittent splurges of opposition. The current Garden matchmaker, Jimmy Johnson, once was so annoying as a rival promoter that he was finally taken into the fold.

Turns Down Offers
About a year ago, Jacobs turned down the second of two propositions to pool his fistie interests with the Garden's. It was understood that one stipulation, which Jacobs rejected, was that Johnson must remain as matchmaker. It is no secret that a chronic feud exists between these two operators.

The origin of the 20th Century Sporting Club was due partly to financial differences between the Garden and representatives of the Free Milk Fund For Babies, Inc., of which Mrs. William Randolph Hearst is chairman. This split led to an alliance between the Hearst charity sponsors and Jacobs.

Fortified by his long-term contract with the ring's No. 1 drawing card, Joe Louis, Jacobs steadily has strengthened his position. In addition to the "big three" in the current tangle, Max Baer's comeback now is slated to be conducted under the 20th Century banner.

Heavyweight fights promoted by Jacobs, featured by the million dollar Louis-Baer bout in 1935, have grossed more than \$2,000,000 in two years. The seven heavyweight title bouts promoted under Garden auspices from 1930 to 1935, grossed only \$2,250,000.

It is curious to note, incidentally, that the biggest money bout of all time, the second Dempsey-Tunney fight at Chicago, produced one of the smallest percentages of profit. The match grossed \$2,658,000, averaging more than \$25 per cash customer, but the payoffs left only about \$300,000 for the promoters. Tunney's end was \$900,000, and Dempsey's \$425,000, so that, in every respect, it was the dirtiest piece of fistie financing of all time.

structure, superseding the other, older schools, and the students were to have ridden to their studies daily via bus.

A communication from John N. Landberg, Philadelphia lawyer for the plaintiffs, however, pointed out that 84 per cent of the taxpayers and three-fourths of the voters in East Lampeter were members either of the Amish or Mennonite faiths.

The traditions of these religions, the protest said, not only forbid children from riding in automobiles except in emergencies, but preach against borrowing of money at interest for commercial purposes.

The citizens met last Wednesday, Landberg continued, and adopted a resolution which said East Lampeter already had plenty of schools, that the school board had gone over the heads of the voters, thereby violating the law, and that the deal was "unauthorized, illegal and fraudulent."

Their resolution added: "The automatic, high-handed action of said school board, in disregard of our majority voters and taxpayers violates our property rights and said board's trampling upon our religious sentiments and convictions is violative of our privileges under the bill of rights and the first amendment of the federal constitution."

They asked there that the PWA rescind its loan and grant and thus nullify "the flouting of our franchise by an arrogant, lawless school board."

The only time anybody else ever asked for less federal money, instead of more, PWA officials recalled, was in Minnesota, said they didn't want the government building any federal roads across their reservation. They said they wanted no roads and no visitors.
