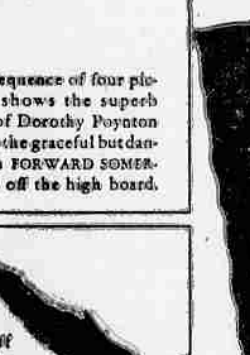

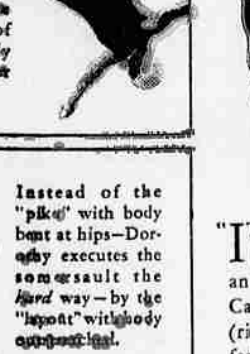

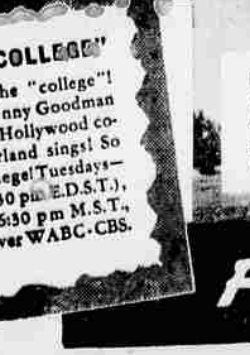
1 This sequence of four pictures shows the superb form of Dorothy Poynton Hill in the graceful but dangerous FORWARD SOMERSAULT off the high board.
