CMTC Camp to Open On July 1; Local Men Sought
Quotas for this section for the annual Citizens' Military Training camp, to open at Vancouver barracks, Wash., July 1, are not completely filled yet, it is reported from the local CMTC headquarters.

The camp will run for a 30-day period, opening July 1 and is part of the annual training offered approximately 40,000 young men from 17 to 24 years of age. Of this total, 548 will be trained at Vancouver barracks. Each man receives allowance to and from his home, uniforms, meals, bedding, and equipment, all without charge. Successful completion of four summer camps leads to a commission as a lieutenant in the reserve corps of the U. S. army.

Dr. Carl W. Robbins, lieutenant colonel in the medical reserve, is Lane county chairman for the camp and those interested are asked to see him or communicate with the CMTC headquarters.

The young men going to this camp are organized into an infantry battalion. The hours of instruction for military training are from 7:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. The afternoons are devoted to recreation and athletics.

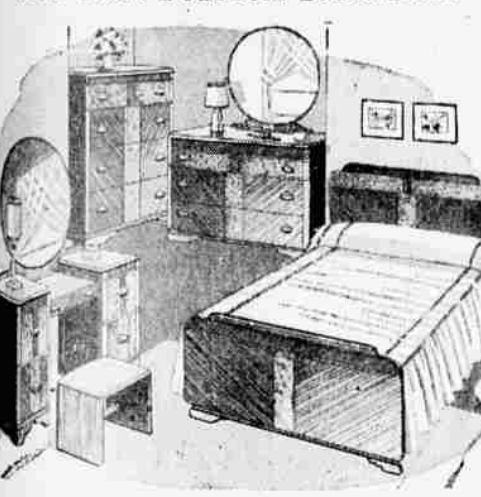
