EX-WEBFOOT GOLF CAPTAIN DEFEATS SALVADOR, 3 AND 2

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—(AP)—Don Moe of Alderwood club, former U. of O. golf captain, regained the Oregon golf championships he held in 1925 today, defeating Harold Salvador, Columbia-Edgewater champion, 3 and 2, in the finals of the 13th annual Oregon Golf association tournament.

Marian McDougall of Waverley retained her women's championship, defeating Dorothy Sellers, Alderwood, 5 and 6.

Moe, former Walker Cup star, finished the first 15 holes with a 71 against a 74 for Salvador, winner of the Oregon boy's championship in 1932.

Despite a three-hole handicap, Salvador offered stubborn resistance this afternoon, halving the first three holes with par fours. A par on the fourth and a birdie on the fifth cut his opponent's lead to one.

Moe recovered to lead two up on the 27th. The nip-and-tuck battle ended on the 34th green, the hole being halved.

Miss McDougall took an early lead in the morning's play by winning five of the first nine holes, and finished five up at the end of the first 18.

In additional flight matches, played over the 18-hole route, Arlon Kyle, Eastmoreland, defeated Don Thompson, Waverley, 3 and 1, and Doug Nicol, Portland, defeated Willard Clinton, Riverside, 3 and 2.

J. S. McCool, Eugene's lone entry after the second round, was eliminated Friday by Don Coles, University of Oregon golfer from Oswego. The score was 5 and 4.

Mrs. J. S. McCool, Mrs. Rose Finegan and Mrs. Grace Moore, all of Eugene, were eliminated in previous matches.

Great Washington Crews Leave For Poughkeepsie; Triple Win Doubtful

GREAT WASHINGTON—6 Sp.—SEATTLE, June 12.—(AP)—With a fair chance to duplicate their triple triumph of last year the three crews of the University of Washington departed yesterday to defend their national championships in the international rowing regatta at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., June 22.

In the big event on the Hudson river last season the mighty Washington navy rowed off with the varsity, junior-varsity and freshmen titles to become the first school to ever score a three-way sweep.

This year Coach Al Ulbricksen has again built three speedy water-wagons. This fact was proven when the Huskies won all three races from the California Bears in the Pacific coast regatta with the freshmen and junior-varsity boats establishing new records on the Oakland estuary course.

And the same oarsmen who rowed undefeated "around the world" last season, clinching the tour with an Olympic games victory in Berlin, are still manning the varsity shell. They won the Pacific coast, national and Olympic titles in 1936.

Ulbricksen is hoping, of course, but he is hardly expecting his galley slaves to make it a grand slam again. "We'll be trying, but don't count on us too much for another clean sweep," was his parting shot.

"Our varsity is as fast as it was last year, but it runs hot and cold. One day it looks great and the next not so hot. Also we expect stronger competition. Navy has a fast boat and you can't overlook Cornell, California and even Syracuse.

"The Washington junior-varsity is one of the finest we have ever had and with only three entries in this event we might take it. Our freshmen boat is about average but you never can tell what kids will do in a race."

John Rosencranz, in the coxswain's seat, is the only new member among the Olympic champions. He succeeded Bob Moe who was graduated and became an assistant coach under Ulbricksen.

Five of the eight varsity oarsmen are seniors and will be making their last bid for rowing fame. They are Roger Morris, bow; Charles Day, No. 2; Capt. Jim McMillin, No. 5; George Hunt, No. 4; and Joe Rantz, No. 7.

Don Hume, poker-faced pace-setter, one of the greatest of Washington strokes, and Gordon Adam, No. 3 and John White No. 4, have another season ahead.

The coach said that failure of Jack Carey, No. 4 jayvee oarsman, to shake off the effects of illness made it uncertain that he would regain his seat. Ewen Dingwall has been taking his place. Otherwise all the lineups will be the same as scored a clean sweep over California.

The Washington crew party of 36 left for the east at 9:20 o'clock last night. Ulbricksen planned a day stop-over in Chicago for a workout on Lake Michigan.

With his team a run behind, two mates on base and two out, Vosmik drove a hard smash to left center, sending in Tom Carey with the tying run and Harry Davis with the winning tally.

RECORD 281 SCORED BY RALPH GULDAHL WINNING U. S. OPEN

BIRMINGHAM, Mich., June 12.—(AP)—Big, stoop-shouldered Ralph Guldahl, the man who "called" his comeback today, clinaxed an epic golf struggle today with a record-smashing triumph in the 41st open championship of the United States.

The 25-year-old Chicago freelance professional, so destitute a year ago that a friend helped him get his clubs "out of lock" came from behind in miraculous finish to post a world record aggregate of 281 for big time competition.

In capturing the open title the Texas-born giant-whipped old man par by seven full shots over the historic Oakland Hills layout, led his nearest rival, slammign Sam Snead, by two strokes, and clipped a shot from the former world and American open championship record of 282, set a year ago at Baltusrol by Tony Manero.

8,000 Spectators

Guldahl registered successive rounds of 71, 69, 72 and 69. A gallery of nearly 8,000 spectators was wild with excitement.

Guldahl's final round was a rare combination of courageous recoveries and miracle shotmaking after Snead, the boy wonder from the hills of West Virginia, had posted a near-record total of 283.

Lost completely in the concluding charge of the light brigade was Tony Manero. The 1936 titleholder wound up 19 shots behind the winner with an even 300.

Snead's 69-75-70-71 for the tournament represented an amazing freshman performance and marked the young West Virginian as a coming champion.

Snead's putter lost some of its characteristic magic on the final round. He carded five birdies but three-putted the first, fifth and 17th, thereby losing three shots that meant the difference between victory and the runner-up's money.
