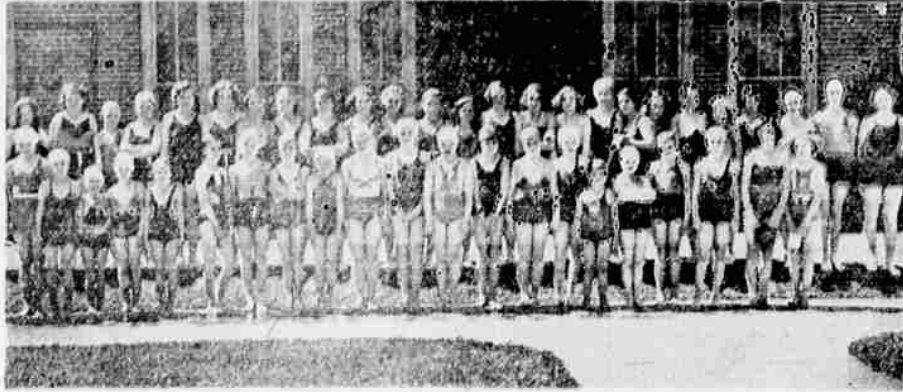


### CORVALLIS MOOSE TO INITIATE HERE

### Strawberry Weevil Control Time Here

A warning was issued Saturday by C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, that now is the time to eradicate the strawberry root weevil. One baiting should be undertaken at this time, he said, followed by another within 10 to 15 days.

The recommended treatment is application of bran-molasses bait, composed of 100 pounds of bran, two to four gallons of molasses, five to eight gallons of water, and five pounds of sodium fluosilicate. This mixture, applied in half-teaspoon "shots" to each plant, is 97 per cent efficient in eradicating the weevil and has been carefully tested in experiment stations during the past three years. Other ready-mixed compounds are also effective, he declared.

### PAGEANT QUEEN MUST BE PIONEER

A diminutive Junior Queen and Pilot will reign at the Oregon Trail Pageant celebration Thursday for the first time this year.

The Little Queen and Pilot must be of the fifth generation descended from a pioneer family in Oregon. The descendant of the oldest families will be Queen and Pilot, and they will be attended by three princesses and three scouts from the next oldest families. The contest will be statewide, sponsored by the Pageant committee here.

Mrs. William Tugman, who heads the children's activities on the Pageant committee, will assist with direction of the contest. The Pageant historical committee, with Dr. R. C. Clark as chairman, will examine credentials of all entries to determine the winners.

The children will take part in the Pioneer Parade, riding on a special float, and will rule over the big Pioneer ballroom following the parade Friday noon. They will also be hostesses of the reception given during the night of the Pageant itself.

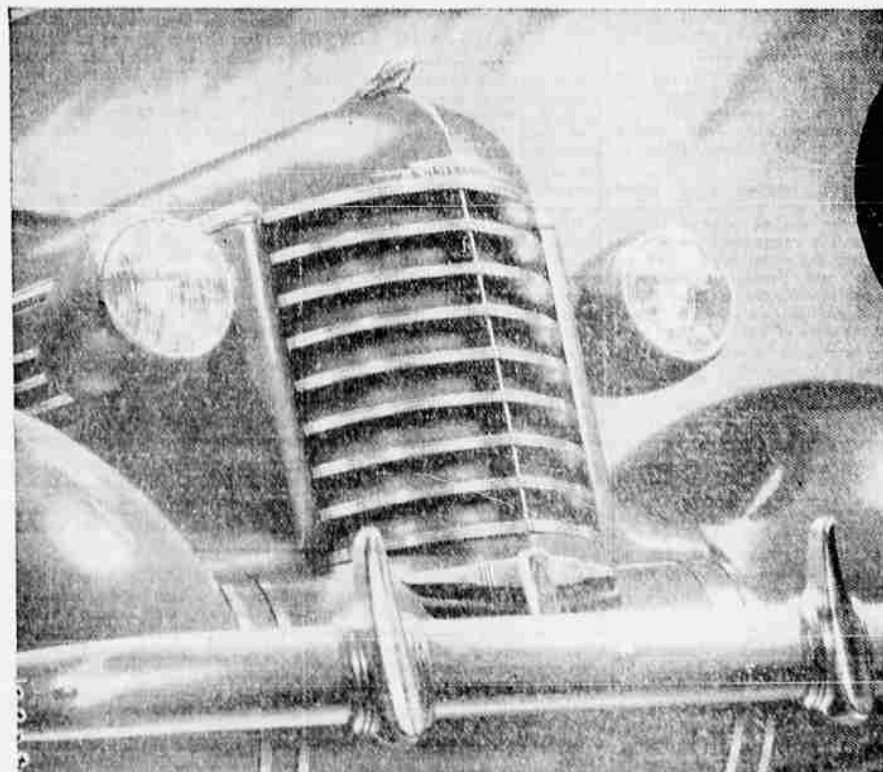
### Job Family Will Hold Annual Picnic
