the attackers had opened a clear way to Bilbao and were firing into the city from nearby heights.

A British destroyer was reported ready at St. Jean De Luz, France, to take officials of the Basque republic out of Bilbao if necessary.

The agreement among Britain, France, Germany and Italy which would bring the two latter powers back to the non-intervention scheme provided that:

1. All warships of the neutral patrol could defend themselves but none should take retaliatory action for an attack without consulting the other three.

2. The two Spanish administrations should be asked to "do their best" to prevent attack on the patrol ships.

3. The whole non-intervention committee of 27 nations should vote on the scheme if the warring Spanish factions agree to concur.

Touching on expectation of increased arrivals of winter wheat are advised that the harvest will be in full swing on the southwestern plains by June 25. Trade predictions are that in consequence many new buyers will be needed to take care of accumulations.

A notable drag on wheat prices of late has been dearth of export business. European prospects on the other hand are for a somewhat smaller crop than last year. Thus was Argentina's surplus about sold out, Australian stocks light, and much less wheat expected from India than earlier promises indicated.

Corn and oats prices mainly reflect the big supplies of Argentine corn available. Downturns of hog values and of grains find a counterpart in provisions.

the size of his present location at the northeast corner of Willamette street and ninth avenue.

Urban Smith, local architect, has laid the plan for the new building and will see to it that the office building is tenanted by specifications.

Flush with Sidewalk One of the three new stores, with its frontage, will be constructed on the sidewalk with frontage on the north and Appleton streets to the south. The second and third stores will be set back ten feet, the building of the present building.
