Basic Pattern Selected As Model For Women's Pageant Time Dress

Following many requests for information regarding the official dress for women for the Oregon Trail pioneer pageant, Mrs. G. E. Lehman and Mrs. W. C. Underwood, the costume committee chairmen, have outlined some of the details for such dresses. A basic pattern pioneer woman's costume has been selected. Not only will this be the approved dress for this year's event but for all future pageants as well.

The characteristic features of the pioneer dress will be the long very full skirt, the tight-fitting bodice and sleeves either long and tight or full according to the preference of the wearer.

Replica Displayed
Based on this general pattern, a replica of which is on display at the headquarters of the costume committee, variations are suggested such as the three types placed in the Washburne store display windows—the basic—patterned or morning dress, and two variations of this style—a dress for young women, and an all-occasion dress.

Mrs. Frank L. Chambers, pageant chairman for all women's activities, is urging that every woman or girl in Lane county feel her responsibility for aiding in the success of the pageant by donning a pioneer costume as soon as possible and by wearing such costumes on every possible occasion until after the pageant dates. Mrs. Chambers calls attention to the unanimous response of the men in advertising the pageant and promises that the women will not fail in their part.

Mrs. Underwood who has given much time to research in connection with authentic details of costumes, especially to the decade 1840-1850 has contributed the following information which will be helpful in designing the individual costume:

"Light bodices were made with points in both front and back, if desired. Sleeves were tight or full according to the fancy of the wearer. Some had an epaulet called a 'jockey' others had a loose sleeve showing an undersleeve of cambric or other material.

"Skirts are full, five or eight yards at the lower edge, slightly gored or straight. They were trimmed with folds, flounces or ruffles, or were entirely plain. This was a period of small waists, to get the effect the skirts were very full.

Bonnets Described
"A small silk bonnet to match the dress or a small poke bonnet of straw trimmed with flowers or feathers, seemed to be most generally worn. 'Pantaloons' held away from about 1818 to 1855 but were worn almost entirely by children."

Preparatory to designing dresses for the pageant queen and her princesses, Mrs. Lehman has assembled a number of interesting notes on the costumes of women pioneers, some of which follow:

"Stiffly starched undershirts were worn to spread out the dresses and they were so full over the hips that the waist appeared very small in proportion. The shoulders of bodices were cut long and sloping and the sleeves were almost skin tight. Shoulder caps of embroidered muslin and lace were very fashionable. Turned down collars were most popular but narrow ruffings were also worn at the throat and wrists. Delaines, silks, cashmeres, and challis were popular materials for dresses. "White shawls were popular addi-

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SOCIAL SECURITY LISTS TO BE FILED BY 30TH OF JUNE

Southwestern Oregon employees in commerce, industry, and professional service covered by the federal old-age benefit system of the social security act will be issued social security account numbers through the Eugene office of the social security board after June 30, according to an announcement Saturday by Laurence E. Fischer, Eugene manager of the social security board.

"The present arrangement between the board and the post office department in which the latter accepts applications for social security accounts and issues the numbers expires at the end of the month," Mr. Fischer said. "Thereafter, the social security board will handle this work through its field offices except that the postoffices in cities where the board does not have an office will continue their cooperation on a limited basis by maintaining a supply of application forms (SS-5) for the convenience of local employers and employees."

Mr. Fischer said arrangements have practically been completed for taking over the handling of applications for social security accounts and the making of a permanent record of the information which the federal government requires in connection with its old-age benefit system. The Eugene office will issue account numbers to employees in Lane, Douglas, Coos, Curry, and Josephine counties.

It was also urged that all employees working in occupations covered by the social security act file applications for social security accounts with their local postoffices at once if they have not done so. He emphasized that a social security account is essential to setting up a record of the employee's wages upon which monthly retirement benefits at age 65 are computed. Also, that it simplifies the employer's task when he hires new employees.

By June 30 every employer in industry, commerce or professional service must have the social security account number of each employee under 65 years of age who has worked for him since January 1. This information is required in connection with a report to be filed with the collector of internal revenue in July. If an employer fails to obtain a number, the employer must file an application for an account number on the employee's behalf, according to Treasury Department regulations.
