

Miss Margaret Ann Smith Weds Dr. Donald Barclay Slocum, Saturday

Impressive Ceremony Held At Home Before Large Group; Reception Follows

CANDLE light from scores of tall white tapers glowing over masses of white and varying shades of pink flowers formed the setting for one of the season's most impressive weddings, Saturday evening, when Miss Margaret Ann Smith, daughter of Richard Shore Smith, became the bride of Dr. Donald Barclay Slocum of Portland. The ceremony was solemnized at seven-thirty o'clock at the Smith residence, Dr. Victor P. Morris of the University of Oregon faculty officiating and a large assembly of relatives and friends attending.

The service took place before a large mirror in the living room. At either side stood a tall wrought iron standard with a large copper bowl, each bowl massed with white blooms, and lighted tapers standing up from the center of the flowers. Light flickered from many other tapers placed in the window and on the mantel, mellowing the profusion of white and pink peonies, snapdragons, gladioli, and larkspur that decorated the room.

Preceding the ceremony music was played by a quartet, Mrs. Clarence Veal of Albany, violin, Mrs. Roberta Spicer Moffitt, cello, Mrs. Winsor W. Calkins, harp, and Robert Garretson, piano. Just before the service, Hal Young sang two solos and the quartet played the wedding march from Loehring. During the ceremony, Mrs. Calkins played the harp.

Bride's Dress Described
The bride, given in marriage by her father, was a beautiful picture in her wedding gown of white organza. The dress was cut in princess style with square neck, a very long train, and Schiaparelli style sleeves. The only trimming was selected double white fluting banding the neckline, the short sleeves, and the hem of the very full skirt which fell in a semi-circle. The veil of white tulle fell in a long train and was arranged in half length with the double material. The veil fell from a cap bound of orange blossoms and Cecil Brunner roses. For her flowers the bride carried a shower bouquet of white spray orchids, lilies of the valley, and pink and white bouvardia. Tiny bouquets of French pink roses and bouvardias were caught in the shower of white ribbon.

Attendants Listed
Miss Martha Goodrich was maid of honor for her cousin and Mrs. Robert W. Lucas of Portland was matron of honor. They were dressed alike of coral-flow blue organza over white tulle, trimmed in blue velvet. Little bouquets of garden flowers were caught here and there over the taffeta beneath the sheer organza. The two wore wreaths of gardenias and carried large bouquets of cornflowers tied with French pink ribbon.

The four bridesmaids were Miss Virginia Slocum of Portland, sister of Dr. Slocum, Miss Bernice Healey of Portland, Miss Eleanor Kirkley of Los Angeles, and Miss Margaret Schaefer of Eugene. Their dresses were like the honor attendants but trimmed in French pink velvet. Their flowers were long garlands of cornflowers, yellow and white daisies, and pink roses, the garlands appearing to form an aisle as the four stood together.

Three Jones of Portland was best man for Dr. Slocum and the ushers were Paul Murphy, Donald Holman, Dr. Richard Berg, and Edmund Labbe, all of Portland, and William Russell of Eugene. The men of the bridal party all wore white tuxedo coats and dark trousers, the attendants wearing blue cornflower buttonholes, Dr. Slocum a carnation.

Mrs. Samuel Slocum, mother of the bridegroom, wore a dress of ash of rose lace over satin and a corsage of orchids.
