

## FLOOD CONTROL PROBLEM IS TOPIC AT LIONS MEETING

The people of the Willamette valley should not put off too long the problem of flood control was a comment of W. M. McGibbon of Cottage Grove, one of the staff of army engineers who have been surveying this section. Of the appropriations allotted recently the entire northwest received but \$10,000,000, and it appears that if the Willamette valley gets much in the next few years the people here are going to have to go out and get it themselves, he added.

While agricultural interests suffer some 90 per cent of the total damage from floods, there are many others, he said. Studies compiled by the state highway department show the Willamette highways in 24-hour periods are travelled by 73,000 automobiles, trucks, etc., that are all subject to be submerged in times of floods. These figures but hint at the great amount of damage to business and other phases, it was said. All these people affected, therefore, should co-operate and pay their share in meeting the problem, the speaker pointed out.

Several other interesting ramifications of the subject were discussed by the speaker. The population figures for this section have increased enormously within the past 10 years and as these figures continue to grow the flood problem becomes greater, the speaker pointed out. Such sections as Santa Clara and Garden Way around the Eugene vicinity and similar sections elsewhere have seen especially large increases in population due to the rich soil. Quoting figures, Mr. McGibbon stated the surveys reveal more than 500 suburban homes, nearly 125 suburban business firms, nearly 2,000 farm homes, and 7,000 farm units, all involving more than 100,000 people over 320,000 acres are in the direct line of flood damage in the valley section.

There is a vast amount of water falling in this section and the Willamette is fed by many important tributaries; so the start for the flood control program would be to begin on the tributaries with reservoirs, it was said. Through such a system, Eugene and immediate vicinity could be protected to 98 per cent efficiency. Due to the nature of the valley the efficiency would drop off

going northward, being 80 per cent at Albany, about 70 per cent at Salem, and around 65 per cent in the Oregon City region. Mr. McGibbon reviewed briefly the big floods of the past, those in the early 1800's period, the flood of 1861, the one of 1890, and then the more recent series. He spoke briefly of the two programs as studied by the army engineers, one costing an estimate of \$27,000 to \$50,000 and involving flood control, purification, and some irrigation; the other costing some \$10,000,000 taking in flood control, irrigation, some navigation, purification, and power.

The speaker was introduced by Hugh P. Currin. Reports were given on the state convention closing in Medford Tuesday by Earl Benson, J. P. Schimberg, Dr. H. R. Allumbaugh, Dr. P. J. Bartle, and Joe Richards.

## WATSON GETS FIVE YEARS FOR FORGERY

Ray Watson, 28, former Eugene resident, was sentenced by Judge G. F. Skipworth in circuit court Wednesday morning to serve five years in the state penitentiary on a charge of uttering and publishing a forged check. He had pleaded guilty.

As the judge pronounced sentence he warned Watson that the next time he is sent to the penitentiary it will be for life under the habitual criminal act. District Attorney L. L. Ray stated in court that Watson has served two terms on forgery charges and that he has just completed a 30-day sentence at Salem for larceny.

Watson's attorney, Winsor Callins, stated that Watson, on the day he committed his crime, had been drinking all day and he claimed that when he passed the bad check in question he had no recollection of the amount of the check or whose name he had signed to it.

## GENERAL STRIKE CALLED IN OHIO

to gather data on the charges filed June 18 by John L. Lewis, C. I. O. against the steel companies.

The charges included alleged discrimination in the discharge of union employees, coercion through the shutdown of a Canton, O., plant of Republic Steel, the use of "armed thugs and gunmen," and alleged "collusion" with Sheriff Ralph E. Elzer of Youngstown to interfere with picketing.

### Quiet Reigns

Quiet reigned along the valley mill front, where steel executives yesterday called off a projected "back-to-work" march at the personal behest of President Roosevelt.

The tall mill stacks emitted only thin wisps of smoke and the skies over the grimy mill towns were clear as the strike entered its twenty-eighth day.

Almost the only sign of renewed activity on the industrial battlefield was the movement of freight at the Republic Steel corporation's plant at Warren, O.

Halted for the past ten days by strikers, the freight cars moved in and out again today under the protection of national guard rifles and machine-guns.

Workers who have been besieged in the plants since the strike started four weeks ago, sleeping and eating in the mill, also moved freely as the federal troops enforced a court injunction restraining the activities of strike pickets. The company said approximately 2,000 had remained in the plant.

A deputy United States marshal and a post-office inspector left Cleveland for Akron, O., today to obtain warrants charging "interference with the United States mails" against three Youngstown and three Warren men.

District Attorney Emerich B. Freed said the men stopped mail trucks at the Warren and Youngstown plants of Republic Steel, a misdemeanor involving a possible maximum sentence of six months and a \$500 fine with costs.

The senate post-office committee in Washington is investigating shipment of mails to strike-bound plants, and the Republic Steel corp. has brought a mandamus action against Postmaster General James A. Farley seeking to enforce the delivery of any packages—whether containing food and other living necessities or not—to its plants.

While the federal mediators pushed efforts for peace in Cleveland, Tom Girdler, president of Republic Steel, and C. I. O. Chairman Lewis both were in Washington.

Senator Bridges, republican of New Hampshire, said he would ask Girdler whether the corporation has made an oral agreement with steel union representatives.

Remains Deadlocked  
Girdler, along with executives of the three other independent steel companies, has refused point-blank to sign written agreements with the C. I. O., thus keeping the multi-million dollar controversy deadlocked.

At Johnstown, Pa., still under martial law declared by Gov. George H. Earle, the city's business leaders expressed alarm at the prospect of losing the community's chief income through the shutdown of Bethlehem Steel's giant Cambria works.

Lawrence Campbell, chairman of the citizens committee, insisted the strike had been broken before martial law was declared and said the mills would be operating at capacity today if the governor had not stepped in.

With the cost of the strike estimated at \$12,000,000 to date, payless days and smokeless stacks stood forth today as silent but earnest pleaders for settlement of the strike.

## NAZIS, ITALY DESERT PACTS

schland by Spanish government airplanes.

They quit today in angry reply to the refusal of Great Britain and France to join them in a naval display to warn the Spanish government: "Hands Off Our Warships."

Fleet on Move  
Four warships of the German fleet in Spanish waters steamed past the rock of Gibraltar into the Mediterranean in the general direction of Valencia. Three others were reported off Ceuta, Spanish Morocco.

A German naval division, headed by the battleship Admiral von Scheer, entered the Tagus river at Lisbon preparatory to proceeding into the Mediterranean.

In Berlin, there were unconfirmed rumors of a possible Italo-German blockade of the Spanish government coastline.

Nazis blamed Great Britain for the breakdown of London four-power negotiations on Germany's demand for a united parade of warships before Valencia following upon an alleged Spanish government submarine attack on the German cruiser Leipzig.

Germany had asked the display under the four-power agreement which brought the Reich and Italy back into the international control scheme. Under the agreement, any attack on a patrol ship was to be the "common concern" of the powers.

"Attack Impossible."  
But the Spanish government asserted it would have been impossible for a Spanish submarine to have attempted to torpedo the cruiser Leipzig because on the day of the alleged attack all Spanish undersea boats were at their bases. And Britain and France refused to join any naval demonstration against Valencia.

Insurgents reported meanwhile the capture of three strategic Basque cities and the most important iron foundries and munition factories in northwestern Spain. In their advance on Santander, the conquerors of Bilbao asserted Portuguese, Sexton and Baracaldo, all on the west bank of the river Nervion, and many small villages had been taken.

Americans Arrested  
At Barcelona, five United States citizens were reported held by police for questioning after they allegedly entered Spain from France.

General Sebastian Pozas, commander of the Catalan forces of the Spanish central government, said today he had ordered warplanes to protect a British freighter that had appealed for aid against an Italian warship.

Terming the plywood industry the "baby" of American lumber production, the booklet foresees a bright future in this branch.
