A program, a talk by Cal Young, and fireworks will be features of the Oregon Trail Pageant program in connection with the Holman's grocery fireworks display Wednesday, June 30, at 8 o'clock.

Gold All Gone In U. S. Hills, Says Bureau Of Mines

WASHINGTON, June 26.—(AP)—The bureau of mines and the works progress administration let it be known today that "there's darn little gold in them hills."

The agencies said the average Inexpert gold prospector makes about \$72 a year, then added:

"It (a joint survey) demonstrates conclusively the futility of following the suggestion, frequently made in recent years, that large numbers of people be encouraged to become gold miners as a means of solving the unemployment problem."

The survey showed 28,000 unemployed who turned to small placer gold mining sold some gold during 1935. Working an average of 45 days each during the year, they grossed an average of \$1.60 for each working day, or \$72 a year. Other thousands made nothing.

going. The men are coming back." They said thousands of mill hands returned to Mahoning valley steel plants under the protection of Ohio national guardsmen during the day.

Just Before to Fight
C. I. O. chieftains retorted: "We have just begun to fight."

At the eastern end of the salient, at Johnstown, union officials mapped plans for a huge Sunday mass meeting of coal miners and striking steel workers. Union officials said they expected "between 50,000 and 100,000 men."

The situation in Johnstown appeared potentially the same as at last week-end's crisis, when Gov. George H. Earle proclaimed martial law and shut down Bethlehem Steel's Cambria works after a similar threatened march by 40,000 miners to demonstrate "sympathy" for the steel strikers. Governor Earle lifted martial law at 7 a. m. yesterday, permitting the works to reopen.

FORD HELD RESPONSIBLE
DETROIT, June 26.—(AP)—The national labor relations board, charging the Ford Motor company with responsibility for "malicious and brutal assaults" on United Automobile workers' organizers, issued a complaint against the company today and set July 6 for a hearing.

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38 LANE COUNTY FARMS FOR SALE

Thirty-eight farms in Lane county valued at \$327,150, with a total acreage of 8811 have been catalogued and mapped by the Commerce Mortgage company, financial correspondents for the Traveler's Insurance company. The farms, most of which were taken over during the depression, are now up for sale, according to Bruce Sifton, superintendent of the Lane county farms.

A service has been carried out whereby the soil on each place has been analyzed and mapped, showing the types of soil, the depth, amount under cultivation at the present time, and the uncultivated land.

Each type of soil is shown on the maps to assist the buyer in determining the type of farming best suited to the property. The company also arranges a crop program, according to the soil conditions in order to maintain productivity. Aid is also given in planning drainage and irrigation systems, as well as long-range improvements to increase the value of the property.

Recommendations are also given for the type and amount of equipment needed, according to the farm, and how much livestock can be kept successfully.

Crop rotations, according to the soil, have been calculated for each farm. Mr. Sifton pointed out:

A prospective buyer is furnished with a complete file on the farm, which he is interested, a soil map, crop rotation schedule, and information concerning the buildings on the property.

other parts of the city are under consideration for neighborhood development. In no case is the city contemplating any use of cash funds for the acquisition of sites but the use of lands it now holds for this purpose.

Community leaders expressed interest ranging from polite inquiries to enthusiastic approval.

Councilman Fred Carlson, who has long supported legislation for a better park system in Eugene, declared: "Development is needed along this line, and if this idea insures development of park and recreational opportunities, I'm for it. We're not spending enough on our park board."

P. J. Hanns, also a member of the council, gave more cautious approval to the plan, provided it could be financed "without placing an undue burden on the council."

More skeptical interest was displayed by Mayor Elissa Large, who said: "The idea is a good one, but there is no real need at present. Eventually perhaps, but not now."

Athletic leaders, surprised by the news, professed inability to judge accurately the importance of the plan. "I think it will be a fine thing for the kids and the high school teams provided it isn't too far from town," Prince G. Callison, head football coach at the University of Oregon, declared.

Amos B. Cornell, athletic manager at the university said: "It should be a fine thing, but can't they use the university facilities?"
