The Eugene Health Center, a new institution for perpetuating health, will be opened on about July 1 at 15 East 7th avenue by A. R. Dickson, formerly associated with the Emmanuel hospital of Portland in similar work.

Mr. and Mrs. E. Burdon of Eugene will be associates of Dickson.

Although the new institution will be confined to the sale of health foods and giving mineral and vapor baths and massages at present, Dickson plans to install a battery of sun lamps and Turkish baths before the winter season. "We plan to run this clinic in cooperation with the local medical and pharmacy profession," Dickson said Monday.

OUR HOME TOWN

OLD FOLKS
By CLARENCE V. SIMON

Sometimes I marvel at the patience which the very old show with the rest of us. They see us flouting the principles which they know so well to be sound. They see us with more literacy than their old times knew—but with less reading, manifesting more self-interest but less self-reliance, possessed of more scientific knowledge, but less common sense, with more widespread pacifism and with greater danger of war, with more daring of life and limb but with less courage in adversity, knowing more pleasure but less happiness.

We espouse with enthusiasm, whatever new "ism" strikes our fancy. And the very old smile at us as at children building castles in a sand pile. Back through their years they look, and find lonely truths which resolve our fine theories into their component fallacies.
