U. S. FISCAL YEAR ENDS; DEBT HUGE

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security old age reserve fund this month. It had been intended originally to make the deposit in the next fiscal year.

Including emergency and relief outlays in the spending estimate, treasury statistics showed that expenditures went \$137,000,000 over the president's revised estimate on June 26. The computation did not include \$103,000,000 spent to pay off the government debt.

The \$137,000,000 excess over the estimate will increase further when spending is computed through June 30.

Mr. Roosevelt estimated the public debt would stand at about \$36,400,000,000 at midnight tonight. This would be the largest June 30 figure ever recorded but would be \$235,000,000 under the all-time peak of June 15.

The president said the debt has remained virtually stationary since last December except for borrowing to finance treasury gold acquisitions and payments into government life insurance, old age and unemployment insurance reserve funds.

VIOLENCE FLARES IN STEEL STRIKE

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other fronts of the steel strike, called by the SWOC against the Republic, Inland Steel, Bethlehem Steel corporation, and the Youngstown Sheet and Tube Co., over refusal of the concerns to sign labor contracts.

At Johnstown, Pa., James Mark, C. I. O. leader, and C. W. Jones, vice president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, were ordered out of the city by Mayor Daniel J. Shields, who told them their presence was "injurious to community peace."

The two refused to leave and Mark appealed to Gov. George H. Earle for resumption of martial law.

The Youngstown Steel mill district returned to the normal 3-shift operating basis today with 32 out of 47 open hearth furnaces working, and

plant managers reporting operations back on pre-strike schedule.

The Youngstown Sheet and Tube Co., employing 14,500 men normally, resumed the 3-shift schedule this morning following the lead of Republic Steel corporation.

Plant managers claimed 90 per cent of their forces were back at work and operations supervisors were reported re-establishing the five day, 40-hour week for mill hands.

Watch Progress

SWOC strike leaders watched the progress of the reopened mills from downtown headquarters, and dispatched organizers to conduct group meetings of the workers still holding the strike line. Picketing, however, was limited to the streets.

Entire blocks in Canton around Eighth and Belden streets were without telephone service. Wires, ripped from poles, hung on the ground on Eighth street.

Shortly after the movement of workers in and out of the Canton plants began, the guard reported that everything was under control.

GARMENT WORKERS CLASH CLEVELAND, June 30.—(AP)—

Several persons were injured, women's dresses were ripped apart and one man was arrested today in a clash between A. F. of L. and C. I. O. garment workers at the plant of the Stone Knitting Mills Co. here.

The A. F. of L. group forced its way through the C. I. O. picket line into the mill, one of four plants here that had been closed by C. I. O. picket lines in an organization dispute with the A. F. of L.

The A. F. of L. contingent massed near a police station and marched to the plant. Three mounted policemen and 30 patrolmen pushed the C. I. O. pickets away from the plant entrance. Both groups were mostly women.

Santa Monica police arrested him but he was returned to Camarillo before being questioned about the triple slayings. Officers were sent back to Camarillo and brought him to Inglewood.
