

BEND PAGEANT TO DRAW MANY

BEND, Ore., July 1.—(Special).—Bend's fifth annual Mirror pond water pageant, a picturesque river pageant which last year won the acclaim of more than 15,000 people who crowded beautiful Drake park to the river's edge, will be presented next Monday evening as the concluding feature of a three-day, all-Oregon celebration. The pageant will start about 8:30 p. m., as a huge arch is thrown into relief with colored lights.

First floats to glide through the huge portals, in ever changing colors, will be a massive swan, on which will ride the queen of the pageant, and make-believe cygnets, each carrying a princess. Fire-works, spraying the moonless sky with colored sparks, will burst far above the arch as subdued lights are mirrored along the western shore of the placid Deschutes.

Tourist publications, in listing events for visitors from other states, have referred to the Bend water pageant as probably the most spectacular feature arranged for the observance of the Fourth of July in the northwest states this season.

The colorful river pageant will be only one of many features lined up by the civic committee in charge of the three-day celebration. Entertainment this year will be on water, on land and in the sky. More than 60 airplanes are expected to join in the sky circus to be held on the municipal airport, nine miles north of town, on the afternoon of July 4. This sky circus will be presented under the auspices of the Oregon Aviation Development committee.

Other entertainment highlights will include fireworks, a dance revue, baseball, boxing, a pet parade and junior sports in Drake park. The Pendleton baseball team will play the Bend Elks Sunday and Monday.

STATE TO WAR ON DREAD DISEASE

PORTLAND, July 1.—(Special).—Upon the barriers behind which syphilis makes its dread march against public health, medical leaders of Oregon banded a counter assault today, pledged to conquer the last unchecked major disease of the state.

Estimating that Oregon, as a typical state, was accumulating 3,000 new cases annually despite its population of only a million, Dr. Frederick Stricker, state health officer, flanked by a committee of the Oregon Medical association, will employ education, cooperation of the state's army of doctors and prosecution in the courts if need arise to bring about a decline of the disease.

False modesty, failure of physicians to report cases as required by law, refusal of infected persons to seek treatment or their disregard of doctor's recommendations and the ignorance of many doctors of the vagaries of the "great imitator," as the disease is known medically because of its simulation of other infections, was blamed for the continued advance of syphilis.

As the opening gun in his campaign, Dr. Stricker issued orders for a census of the disease beginning today. By it he expects to ascertain its prevalence, sources and locate cases for treatment.

The public will be educated to the fact that quick cures are extremely dangerous; that over-treatment is as injurious as no treatment, and that no drug store remedies can cure the infection. Doctors will be asked to submit cases to physicians specializing in syphilis. Dr. Stricker saying only medical men educated to it can recognize the "hidden chancre," one of the greatest causes of the disease's spread.

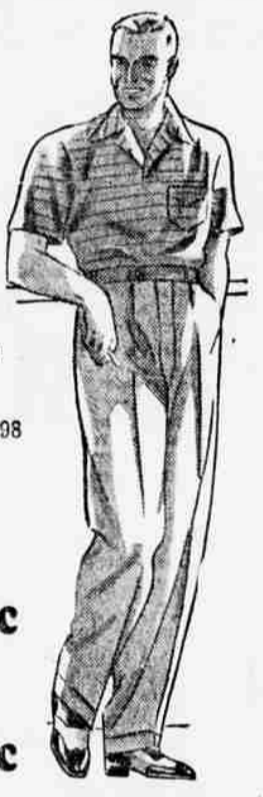
