First in Decade
It was the first time in a decade that a death had been attributed to the use of fireworks. It recalled the "safe and sane Fourth" movement started 30 years ago by James Keeler, Chicago editorial writer, as he sat at the bedside of his sick daughter and saw how much she was disturbed by the barrage of explosions that resounded in her room.

Keely died in June, 1934, but meanwhile thousands of others took up his campaign, selling America the idea of celebrating the day in less dangerous pastimes.

In all parts of the world Americans celebrated the anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

A ham and egg dinner was served to American volunteers fighting with the Spanish government army in Madrid. Civilians in the Spanish capital dined yesterday on official American territory. They sat down to a luxurious meal of ham and eggs, and cake and ice cream in the embassy building.

At Rebild national park in North Denmark, Princess Dagmar, sister of Denmark's king, joined 50,000 persons, mostly Danish-Americans, in celebrating the 25th Fourth of July observance at Rebild.

A reception was given by Ambassador Joseph E. Davies in Moscow. American colonies in Shanghai and other parts of China gathered to shoot firecrackers and enjoy baseball.

BASQUE SPIRIT NOT CRUSHED IS REPORT

SANTONA, Spain, July 5.—(AP)—The president of the Basque republic, Jose Antonio Aguirre, driven from his homeland, declared today "Our territory has been conquered but not the spirit of the Basque people."

"It is never conquered," the defeated leader proclaimed in a statement from this Santander province headquarters, whither he fled with the remnants of his government and army.

The statement disclosed that all the territory of Euzkadi—the "Basques" name for their autonomous state—had been yielded to the still advancing and victorious insurgents.

It bitterly assailed the Valencia government for failure to aid the desperate defenses of the Basque region, which collapsed with the fall of the capital, Bilbao, June 19.

"We will reconquer the land of our fathers, to rescue our persecuted language, our violated laws, our abolished liberties," Aguirre said.

"Our indignation is still greater because in order to take that fatherland from us the Spanish Fascists (insurgents) were forced to call in mercenary forces—Germans and Italians."

The president declared his government and followers "even during the last hours" left Bilbao intact and freed the prisoners.

"I do not wish to think that the peoples of the world, friends or enemies, will remain silent. Is it such a great crime for a people to defend its liberty?" he said.

The president disclosed that Basque casualties in the three-months battle for Bilbao totaled 45,000 dead and wounded.

(A communique from headquarters of insurgent Generalissimo Francisco Franco declared the last Basque resistance had been crushed and the defense of Santander City—20 miles west of Santona—had been entrusted largely to Asturian miners who go into battle throwing sticks of dynamite.

(Twelve thousand Asturians were reported to have been rushed to Santander, last important objective of the insurgents' northern drive. Anarchists were said to dominate the city and to have forced the agent of the Madrid-Valencia government to flee.)
