Justice Belt Says Court Packing Plan FDR's Big Blunder

SALEM, July 7.—(AP)—Justice
 Harry Belt, of the Oregon supreme
 court, in an address before the
 Salem Kiwanis club, termed Presi-
 dent Roosevelt's attitude toward the
 independence of the courts the
 monumental blunder of his career.
 Saying a judge never should be
 above criticism, Justice Belt re-
 marked that neither should he be
 forced to "listen to his master's
 voice" before rendering a decision.
 His remarks were made in a talk
 devoted primarily to a eulogy of
 John Marshall, famed United States
 supreme court justice, who enunci-
 ated the principle that the court
 could invalidate acts of congress
 which violated the constitution.

COUNTY PROTECTED FROM LOG DAMAGE

In order to protect the county
 from any damage done to bridges or
 roads or any other county property,
 due to hauling of extra length logs
 or poles, the county court Wednes-
 day made an order that an en-
 dorsement shall be added to all log
 hauling insurance policies adding the
 words "and or Lane county and its
 officers."

The state law provides that special
 permits shall be obtained for the
 hauling of loads of logs or poles
 longer than 50 feet and the court
 has ordered that such special per-
 mits shall be cancelled as of July
 15 unless proof is furnished that
 the endorsement has been added to
 the insurance policies. A number of
 special permits have been issued by

the county already under this pro-
 vision.
 All log and pole haulers are re-
 quired to take out such insurance,
 anyway, and the court explains that
 the addition of this endorsement, in-
 suring the county from damage
 would cost nothing extra.
