

OLD-TIME SINGING CONTEST FEATURE OF QUEEN'S PARTY

An old-time singing contest has been named as one of the features of the Princess Party to be held Monday night, July 12, at the armory. At the party Queen Susanah IV will be named from among the group of princesses to reign as ruler of the three-day Pageant celebration.

Singers must be over 40 years of age and are asked to register before Monday noon at Pageant headquarters. Western and old-time songs will be presented, to carry out the pioneer theme of the Pageant.

A program featuring the Bolero Girls, and dancing to the music of Carl Rosen's orchestra will be other features of the evening's entertainment. Old-time dancing will also be scheduled and the Wheelers, a group of eight couples, will present a novelty old-fashioned dance.

Following Queen Susanah and her royal court, Hal Young, well-known tenor soloist, will present several selections, accompanied by Robert Garretson.

After the board of judges selects Queen Susanah IV, Her Royal Highness will take her place on a throne on a raised dais in the center of an elaborately decorated stage, and assume royal duties. George Flint and Jack Spear are designing the stage.

The judges, mayors of incorporated cities of Lane county, will select the queen for beauty, poise, carriage, charm, and personality. Those wearing the official pageant badges will be admitted to the program and dancing free. Tickets will be 25 cents apiece.

Lighthouse Is Not For Sale, Reports Official Of Coast

PORTLAND, July 10.—(AP)—Want to buy a lighthouse?

E. C. Merrill, superintendent of lighthouses for Oregon and Washington has a growing list of prospects, all because of an erroneous report that the service intended to dispose of the Umpqua river beacon.

"Some want it for a summer home, some for the bricks in it, and one man wanted it because he was born in it. He didn't leave his name," Merrill said.

"We need that lighthouse. It is one of nine keeping ships off the Oregon shore. We had no thought of disposing of it."

He explained that the service contemplates letting about 110 acres of the lighthouse reservation go to the state park commission for a public park, and that the old Willamette river lighthouse, a frame structure recently replaced, may be offered to the highest bidder.

But the Umpqua lighthouse is not for sale.

One of the first things she wants to get around to doing is to go to the coast and see the ocean.

"So far, my only idea of the sea is what I have read or seen in pictures," she laughs. "This is the nearest I have ever been to the ocean and I certainly mean to get closer in the very near future."

From her Norwegian ancestors, Miss Ledahl inherits the national aptitude for cooking, though she admits the real cook of her home is her mother. But she likes to bake pies and favors the use of electric ovens for this type of cooking.

UN GRADUATES GETTING GOOD JOBS, SALARY

Hopes of University graduates for good positions at real pay are being fulfilled this year on a greater scale than at any time during the past several years, according to a survey made by the "Summer Sun," publication of the University of Oregon Summer Session. Information compiled from the University Placement Bureau shows that not only are permanent jobs easier to find, but the rate of pay is considerably higher than last year, according to the newspaper states.

Although the placement bureau in operation for the first time this year has been of service to a large number of students, many of the graduates were already located before they completed their work in June, it was stated by Karl W. Ontank of the bureau.

The bureau sent cards to 445 graduates, and of these only 193 were returned with "position wanted" checked. Of the total, 175 did not bother to reply, 74 were polite enough to write back that they already had jobs waiting for them, and 23 said that they needed no help.

For the first time in many years, representatives of large concerns visited the campus and interviewed candidates for positions. One of these signed up a University of Oregon graduate at a salary of \$150 per month, and shortly after the young man began working, his pay was increased.

Not only are permanent jobs easier to find, but a considerable increase in part time positions was noted during the past year, according to Miss Janet Smith, general employment secretary.

The Teachers' placement office, with Miss Ida M. Pope in charge, placed 300 teachers this year, and so far this year's business has been running above last year's figures.

Last year many teachers signed up for \$810 a year or \$85 a month, but this year \$900 appears, except in the rarest cases, to be the minimum even for an inexperienced beginner.

check the law against actual practices; to find out what pardon boards are doing in the face of the law.

"For instance," he added, "we set out to find out what the officials can do in the various states and what they actually are doing."

With the funds at hand, Morse said it will be possible to publish four volumes on their findings. Three will review legal and administrative practice aspects of release procedure in the various states. The fourth will contain recommendations for the correction of existing evils and copies of model parole and pardon laws.

"For the most part," Morse said, "statistical studies for Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah, Montana, Nevada and most of California have been completed. Unless we get additional funds, however, no statistical analysis will be published on these states."

Parole Factors Studied

He added, however, that he would seek to weave into the volumes pertinent statistical information or characteristics of favorable and unfavorable factors of parole in the four states.

In making the studies, the WPA workers probed into the case history of each prisoner—literally took them apart mentally, physically and morally. At his finger tips Morse has the personal background and personal, criminal, trial, probation, and institutional histories of thousands of men and women.

KEYS OF EUGENE GIVEN TO ROSSI

Representatives of several San Francisco and Oakland newspapers and the Associated Press witnessed the presentation of the key to the stockade gates of the Eugene pageant, city to Mayor Angelo J. Rossi of San Francisco in his office Tuesday afternoon.

The presentation was made by two pretty granddaughters of Oregon pioneers, Miss Dorothy Hildge, whose grandmother, Mrs. Gray, came across the plains with one of the early wagon trains, and Miss Katherine Hetherington.

In the announcement, sent to eight newspapers and press associations by the special envoy to San Francisco, it was stated that "The State of Oregon will return San Francisco's Golden Gate Bridge fiesta hospitality at the unfolding of the tri-annual Oregon Trail pageant, authentic epic of the West, in Eugene, Oregon, July 22, 23, and 24."

Invitations are being presented to Governor Frank P. Merrill and Mayor Rossi to lead a California cavalcade to the city of Eugene as a return courtesy for the invitation issued to this state which resulted in the Oregon cavalcade, headed by Governor Charles H. Martin, to San Francisco for the Golden Gate bridge opening. It was stated by Dan E. Clark, who headed the special delegation from Eugene.

JAPANESE MOVE ON NORTH CHINA

took up the challenge and seized Lung-wangmiao after two hours' brisk fighting. They said their casualties were heavier than in the earlier phase of the conflict, in which they lost 10 killed and 22 wounded.

Chinese charged the Japanese had broken the truce several hours previously, when they sent 600 soldiers with tanks, machine guns and field pieces from Fengtai to the Yangling area, where they attacked the walled village of Wangpingshen.

There were Japanese reports of a fresh armistice early today, but the Chinese merely said they were trying to "halt the fighting by negotiation."

Dispatches telling of Japanese reinforcements rushing to the Peiping area, some from as far away as Muk-

den, made the outlook ominous. High-erto only units of Japan's relatively small North China garrison have been engaged. The dispatches indicated the army in Manchuria—which totals over 100,000—might become involved.

The Hopei-Chahar council, highest Chinese authority in the north, made public reports that ten trains carrying units of the Kwantung army—Japan's Manchurian force of occupation—had rolled out toward Peiping and two already had passed Shanhaikwan, at the Manchoukuo-China frontier.

Enclerle Peiping Chinese railway officials said two Japanese troops trains which passed through Tientsin reached Fengtai, where troops detrained and moved off in different directions as if to encircle Peiping. About 100 Japanese soldiers were reported near Shihchichuan, 10 miles north of Peiping where the city's electric power station is situated. The trains were said to carry tanks, armored cars, field guns and machine guns.

(Tientsin reported six troop trains from Manchoukuo reached Shanhaikwan, but that the troops detrained and went into temporary barracks there.)

"We are preparing for war," said one high Chinese official, charging Japan alone was responsible for breaking the truce.

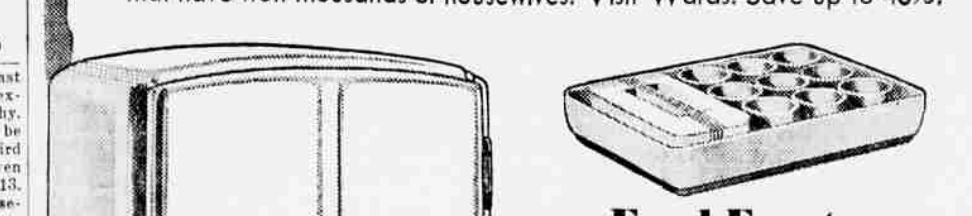
