

COMMITTEE SAYS EXAMS FOR MEN, WOMEN ARE OKAY

SALEM, July 12.—(AP)—Physical examination of all male and female marriage license applicants to "prevent the production and propagation of the mentally unfit and to prevent transmission of disease" would be required under recommendations submitted today by the governor's special committee appointed to study the state psychiatric problem.

The committee's four other recommendations, designed to relieve overcrowding of state hospitals, were:

Extending the child guidance program of the University of Oregon medical school, now limited to Multnomah county, throughout the state.

Establishing a psychiatric hospital at the University of Oregon medical school to treat curable cases, patients discharged from state hospitals, and patients who do not need hospitalization.

Permission from the legislature for the board of control and the board of higher education to enter contractual agreements for building and maintenance at the University of Oregon medical school.

Revision and codification of all Oregon laws providing for the care of the mentally sick.

The committee said the ratio of insane and feeble-minded persons to the total population increased from 311 per 100,000 in 1921 to 460 per 100,000 in 1935.

The recommendations, if adopted, would "go far toward placing Oregon in a position favorably comparable with other states in the care of the mentally sick, and would provide additional service needed in Oregon," the committee said.

About 140,000 persons enter mental hospitals annually throughout the United States, the committee said, asserting it wished to sponsor "well-supervised and sensible sterilization and an intelligent, suitable marriage law" to prevent this influx.

There have been 1,000 sterilization operations in Oregon since the sterilization law was passed in 1923, the committee asserting the law should be extended to include many undesirable who have this liberty.

"These people are propagators of offspring who are unstable, many of whom are headed direct toward a state institution. If the legislature passes our marriage law there would be less need for sterilization."

The patient now must give his consent before being sterilized.

The committee said the present marriage law is unsatisfactory because it requires only physical examination of men, the law being "unconcerned whether women scatter venereal infection or not."

"Our mental defectives, insane, epileptics, chronic criminals, chronic alcoholics, and drug addicts are permitted to enter into wedlock, and propagate children if they so desire."

The proposed marriage law would require the marriage applicants to be examined for venereal diseases, mental illness, physical degeneracy, heredity, and other things.

Mt. Washington Climb Made By 11 Obsidians, Sunday

Eleven persons ascended Mt. Washington, Sunday, the trip being sponsored by the Eugene Obsidian club as one of the most difficult climbs of the season. At 5 a. m. the party started out, taking the Skyline trail at the northeast end of Big lake. They followed the trail for a mile and then headed through the timber toward the north ridge. After working their way up the north ridge to the saddle, they started the ascent of the pinnacle from the west side, working around toward the east ridge. At the base of the chimney, the party stopped for a rest and refreshments, while the leader, Gilbert Sprague, and his two assistants, Dot Dotson and Paul Lafferty, took the ropes up the dangerous outside chimney.

The summit was reached at 12:30 p. m. The party was high in praise of the work of Mr. Sprague as leader, commending him for the care and supervision under which the trip was made, all of the party making the climb safely without even a minor mishap.

GOLD MINING IS AID TO PERSONS WITHOUT JOBS

SALEM, July 12.—(AP)—Many Oregonians, deprived of their jobs during the depression, have kept themselves off the relief rolls by hiking off to the hills in search of gold. O. D. Adams, director of the state board for vocational education, said today:

Adams said the board's mining school at Grants Pass, which in two years it has been operated has trained 2,000 depression victims how to make a living by gold mining, probably would be continued next year, and that an additional school at Baker may be established.

He said a statement by federal relief administrator Harry Hopkins, denouncing a belief that many have been kept off relief by gold mining, did not give a proper picture.

Hopkins said such miners in Oregon earned \$1.60 a day for an average of 45 days a year, worked.

"That is good pay," Adams said, "considering that the type of men who go into the hills generally work in seasonal labor. In what other seasonal occupation can one earn that much?"

"After men work their gold a while, they go into the fruit and hop fields, where they generally don't make that much."

"Hopkins' statement applies to 'snipers'—men who don't own claims but who gain permission from an owner to work his claim."

He said instructors at the school have been unable to contact all the "depression miners" because many of them are back in the hills and find it difficult to get to town. But in many instances, the instructors go into the mountains to help the miners.

No one can pick up mining any more than they can any other industry, Adams asserted, explaining the board's object was to develop the industry.

He said many of the depression miners have made fairly decent livings out of their adopted trade, some of them taking it up as permanent occupations. To illustrate this, he cited the case of a man and his wife who obtained only 50 cents a day between them out of their diggings.

"They came to school for a week, and our instructors taught them how to improve their methods. Five months later when we saw them again they and their two children had new clothes and were earning \$4 to \$6 a day."

"He said he had saved enough money to provide himself with a motor and pump so he could go into larger scale production and eventually buy the claim."
