

NEW COURT BILL BEING PLANNED

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The senate convened today, to send the court bill back to the judiciary committee.

Administration chieftains, however, determined to oppose any showdown until the senate democrats have chosen a new leader to succeed Robinson. Strength in the leadership contest was almost equally split between Senators Harrison (D-Miss) and Barkley (D-Ky). A caucus of party members in the senate is scheduled for tomorrow morning. The question of leadership may be settled at that time.

Statement No Surprise

The administration spokesman said public opposition to the court bill voiced yesterday by Governor Herbert H. Lehman of New York was not particularly surprising to the administration but that the timing of the publication of his letter to Senator Wagner (D-N.Y.) was "deadly" aimed.

The spokesman added that no one in responsible positions in Washington was "furious" or particularly "jolted" by Lehman's action, least of all President Roosevelt.

At the capitol, Barkley said leaders on both sides had agreed to postpone resumption of the fight in the senate until Thursday.

Wheeler and the other opponents refused to discuss reasons for their change in strategy. They only hinted that some of their number wanted to discuss the bill further before a showdown vote.

The Montana denied the change was a sign of weakness. "We've got the votes anytime we want to move to recommit," he said.

Would Sidetrack Bill

The delay in the fight until Thursday gives the new majority leader to be selected tomorrow a chance to work out floor procedure for a test vote on the court measure. If a motion to send it back to the committee should carry, the bill would be sidetracked at least for this session.

The leadership battle was intertwined with the court dispute because Harrison drew his principal support from foes of the bill. Barkley's strength came largely from its friends, including a bloc of first-year senators.

Both candidates were committed personally to the bill.

Merchants Asked To Shorten Store Hours For Parades

MARCONI, NOTED INVENTOR, DIES

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the first radio station at the Vatican and when it was inaugurated in 1931 it was Marconi who introduced Pius, the first pope ever to speak over the radio.

Works on Experiments

Despite his illness yesterday, Marconi insisted on working on his latest micro-wave experiments. The Marquis Luigi Solari, head of the Italian Marconi company, the inventor's biographer and life-long friend, said that late yesterday afternoon Marconi came into his office to talk about his micro-wave experiments.

The Marconi company offices are in the inventor's home and today the employees learned of his death as they arrived for work. They stood together in little groups in the corridors whispering gravely among themselves. Many of them were weeping openly.

Solari said that "Marconi had a great affection for the United States. Next to his own country he had a greater love for America than any other country."

Among the thousands of telegrams of condolence already pouring in was one from Alexander Kirk, charge d'affaires of the United States embassy, who sent it in the absence of ambassador William Phillips on vacation.

Marconi's body will be removed to historic Farnesina palace, headquarters of the Italian royal academy of

which he was president, on the banks of the Tiber this afternoon to be taken for burial to Bologna where he conducted his first experiments in a barn on his father's country estate.

Burial Near Home

Following a preliminary funeral service in Rome, the body will be taken for burial to Bologna where he conducted his first experiments in a barn on his father's country estate.

Marconi apparently had been in good health for the last few days although he had suffered serious illnesses in the last two years.

At the time of his death Marconi was working on three different developments of the principle he discovered: television, especially with the use of ultra short waves; further developments of the micro-wave, a new type radio transmitter for airplanes.

Much of Marconi's work had been devoted to military purposes in the last few years and he had been repeatedly reported at work on a "death ray." This, however, was denied as frequently as it was reported.

Two events of the last year were believed to have accentuated Marconi's heart condition and hastened his death. One was the sudden death of his brother, Alfonso, in London a few minutes before he was to have left for Rome to visit the inventor.

The other was the fire aboard his yacht Elettra in the harbor of

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Civita Vecchia. Much of his experimental work was done in a laboratory on board and when Marconi was aroused by the fire during the early morning he helped fight the blaze for more than an hour.
