Wagon Train Pioneers

Mrs. Cora Hill's Father Is Caught By Opposing Factions in War; Leaves for Oregon



In the year 1865, the American Civil War was in full swing and life was not always pleasant for residents of a so-called neutral state such as Missouri. It was especially difficult for a man with southern sympathies, who did not want to fight, however, and who was about to be drafted into the northern army.

"My father was caught between the two opposing factions of the war and was unable to live a peaceful life in Missouri in 1865," recalls Mrs. Cora Hill, Eugene, who crossed the plains by covered wagon in that year. "So he decided to join the emigrants going westward."

"We left Kansas City, Mo., April 3, 1865, and reached Portland six months later—only to learn that Lee had surrendered while we were on the trail."

Mrs. Hill was only two years old when she came to Oregon and consequently remembers only a few instances of the trip. She remembers one day when her father found a glass salt-cellar in the trail, and riding up behind the wagon tossed it inside.

"Here's a pretty for you, children," he said. Mrs. Hill's older sister got the object, but Mrs. Hill remembers she cried so bitterly for the pretty piece of glass, that her mother gave it to her. She still has the old collar. Mrs. Hill's train was attacked by Indians who wanted to steal the horses being driven along behind the wagons. A small boy, who was herding the animals, was killed during this attack.

Freak Fashions 'Out' For Fall, H. Gordon Finds

Women will dress next fall along less freakish lines than heretofore, in the opinion of Harry Gordon, Eugene merchant who returned Monday from a trip to San Francisco and Los Angeles.

After touring prominent retail shops in the metropolitan districts, Mr. Gordon declared that fashions were adopting a "middle-road" path, and that the results would be less garish and definitely more attractive.

Mr. Gordon was also very optimistic over the labor situation that is being worked out in California. He said that in the wholesale shops and workrooms, committees were formed to represent the workers. Wages were set by this committee. "It is very much easier to make a settlement with labor now than for a long time," Mr. Gordon revealed.

He reported excellent weather conditions, and said that real improvement was continuing at a fast rate, especially with the use of giant machines.

While in California, Mr. and Mrs. Gordon made purchases for some early fall lines. These are some observations on fall fashions made by Mr. Gordon:

Coats and suits with straight, back and fitted lines will be equally popular.

Length of jackets includes nearly all sizes from short to seven-eighths. There will be some tweeds with attractive patterns, but the largest percentage of coatings for sports will be in plain colors, largely of the fleeced variety.

These coats and suit cloths will run to soft, rich weaves both in domestic and imported fabrics. Colors will be black, brown, green, wine and rust.

Dress styles for daytime will be decidedly "dressy." An oft-recurring innovation will be the shirred effect. Dresses are black for early-season showings, with the same colors prevailing as for coats. Rough weaves and silks will also be strongly recommended for dress fabrics.

Formals will be full, and pencil-silhouettes will decline in popularity this season, several leading designers told Mr. Gordon.
