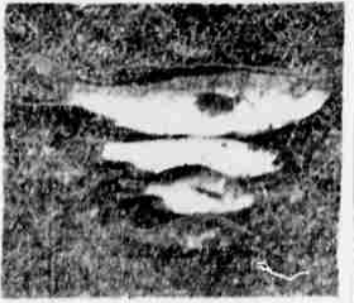


Moran, Higami In Title Mat Match Wednesday

LOOK 'EM OVER

The claim made by the Siuslaw Rod and Gun club that western Lane and Douglas counties is the center of the greatest recreational center in the northwest is not an idle boast. I had the pleasure of attending the last meeting of the sportsmen's organization and also toured a few of the 60 some odd lakes in that area.



The boys are seriously worried by the increasing decrease in fish life in their lakes and streams. During the club meeting last Friday night—the first in the club's 11th year—some of the members doubted if there were still fish in any of the lakes or streams.

Perhaps there has been a steady decline in the number of fish, but there still are plenty of game fish in the lakes and streams. I had the pleasure of making the excursion with Officer Earl Williams, state policeman in charge of game and fish supervision in western Lane county.

After "shooting" a series of pictures of the falls, below Triangle Lake in Lake creek, we arrived at Cushman, L. W. "Larry" Gerrin, president of the club, insisted that Williams take me fishing and commissioned Earl Hill to act as guide. We had a difficult time getting Earl away from the store, but after much coaxing he led us to the upper North Fork of the Siuslaw river.

Williams and I took the high road and Earl the low road and in an hour and a half we met at a designated place with our catches—some 30 enthusiastic salmon, trout and baby steelhead ranging from 6 to 14 inches. Hill tapping the catch with the largest fish. And the boys at the meeting last night cried about the lack of fish.

That cry wasn't idle either. The Siuslaw Rod and Gun club has experienced with their problem. Their findings show that predatory birds in the state destroy twice the number of fish annually that could be produced by double the number of state hatcheries now in operation. The boys have gathered some excellent interesting material which I will try to put together for a feature Sunday story one of these days. The facts will show sportsmen and probably bring hard-core men in terms of the plan for remedying the situation.

Another interesting jaunt—starting at 3:30 a. m. Saturday—was a trip to Tahketchi lake. Larry Gerrin wanted to show me an unusual number of large trout in the lake. Virtually traveling on a log bank, we arrived at the appointed spot about 5:45 a. m. And sure enough, big trout—ranging from 10 to 20 inches—were jumping all over the place. After watching this exhibition we did a little fishing. One of the trout—about 14 inches—look my small dry fly by mistake. Then I managed to catch a blue gill on a Royal Coachman, a three-point bass on a "perch" plug, and a ten inch trout, a perch. The four fish are shown above, top to bottom, bass, trout, blue gill and perch. This presents a good mixture of the variety of fish obtainable in the excellent Cushman Lake. The excellent Cushman Lake is undergoing treatment for a better result.

A moderate amount, with substantial cash awards, will be a feature of the Tillamook Reserves Jubilee at Tillamook and adjacent beaches July 27-28. Mickey Chapman is assisting at the profitable pitching of Lyndon "Shoemaker" Rans. Mickey, cheerful and looking well, is expected to win a victory and receive his managerial duties within the month.

Bill Higami is managing the club while Charlie Galt is undergoing treatment for a better result.

Oregon Trail Pageant festivities will officially open at the army Wednesday night when Promoter Herb Owen presents an all-star professional wrestling show topped by a Pacific coast middleweight championship match between Champion Sailor Moran and Challenger Tetsura Higami.

The two other matches will be fought together, the Black Panther against Otis Clingman in the 45 minute semi-final and Sandy MacDonald against Mickey McGuire in the 30 minute opener. All six grapplers have appeared in main-event spots here and in Portland during the past month.

A feature of the evening's entertainment will be the fourth of a series and the finals of the Pageant's official whisker growing contest. A merchandise prize will be awarded Wednesday's winner and he will then compete with the three previous winners for a \$25 cash award offered by the Army and Navy store.

Local mat addicts have given up hope of anyone defeating Moran in a championship match despite all indications pointing to a Higami victory.

Defeated Moran
The Japanese judo-jitsu artist defeated Moran in a non-title match here several weeks ago and was impressive in defeating Sandy MacDonald in Portland Monday night. At the same time, Moran lost to Andy Tremaine in two straight falls in Portland on Monday.

But since Moran lifted the crown from Jack Hagee last February he has been successful in defeating his title challengers. Among them, the Black Panther, Marshall Carter and Hagen. Unimpressive in non-title matches, the sailor has always come through with the belt at stake.

The holder of the Gulf States and New England crowns, besides the coast goldfish, was forced to wrestle an extra 20-minute fall last week against Carter and came through with a brilliant, if not ethical, victory. Scheduled to leave the northwest Tuesday, Moran was persuaded to remain for a match against the Japanese "ruler man."

In defeating Moran several weeks ago, Higami apparently was capable of winning as he pleased. But he was forced to use all of his cunning.

Little Betting
In spite of the fact that Wednesday's match will probably attract the largest attendance of the year—based on the advance ticket sales—betting commissions report little money will change hands as the result of the match.

Critics attributed Moran's success to the fact that he is a great "conserver," never exerting himself unless an opening arises for a fall or a decisive maneuver is necessary.

The headline will be a battle of blows against punches against the maturing and dominating judo-jitsu Moran depending on the former and Higami on the latter method. The popular Japanese matinee will give away something around six pounds.

A terrific struggle is expected in the match between Higami and the negro. Both are clean, scientific grapplers, but are hard working, spectacular matinee who usually display an assortment of holds that park as much color as the usual rough and tumble tactics used by amateurs.

It will be the Irish against the Scots in the opening match when Mickey McGuire and MacDonald meet in a struggle capable of stealing the show. Although the two boys have never met, there is as much animosity between them as the recreational lines both follow—McGuire fishing and MacDonald golfing.

The Scottish master of the check-mate hold, will add a definite piquancy to the show when he displays some of the finest crops of whiskers in the country. Many of his friends, the hair friends, despite his meagre hairless appearance, had planned to tour the country as the champion heavyweight middleweight, grappler of the world when he leaves the coast.

Reserved seat tickets are on sale at the Club Uptown store and at Otha's Rainbow. The opening match is scheduled to start at 8:30 p. m.

Northwest Gridmen Lag in Star Voting

PORTLAND, July 21.—(AP)—Tommy Swanson of Oregon State, Del. Bark of the University of Oregon and Ed Goddard of Washington State, northwest candidates for an all-star grid team to play the professional Green Bay Packers, are lagging in the national balloting, the Oregonian said today.

The newspaper gave the totals from northwest balloting as received from its followers: Swanson, 1280; Bark, 1270; Goddard, 1100.

While Bark and Goddard rate relatively higher in the national vote, stronger support from their home region will be necessary to prevent Oregon from being represented in the big charity game the Oregonian said.

Bill Dee, 1st Curve Ball Pitcher, Dies

CHESTER, N. J., July 21.—(AP)—William "Bill" Dee, 73, who often told how he fooled opposing batsmen with what he called the first curve ball in baseball history, died Tuesday.

A world pitcher, Dee said he threw the first curve 56 years ago, surely by accident. He was tossing a few fast ones when the seam on the ball gave him, and there, finger caught in it. The result, he said, was an amazing outcome.

Cooper Favored To Win \$10,000 Chicago Tourney

CHICAGO, July 21.—(AP)—A field of 492 players—218 professionals and 184 amateurs—was entered today in the \$10,000 Chicago Open golf tournament, to be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday at the Medinah Country club.

Entries were closed last night, technically, but tourney officials indicated that a few additional shots makers might be given permission to compete before teeing off today.

Two courses will be used. Eighteen holes will be played Friday and another 18 Saturday for qualifying, half of the field will play the No. 3 course Friday and half the No. 1 course, with players changing courses Saturday. The 50 low scores and ties among professionals and the 25 low scores and ties among amateurs will qualify for the 36-hole final Sunday over the difficult No. 3 layout.

Harry Cooper of Chicago, enjoying his most profitable season, is favored to win, but betting has been light in view of the numerous top-notch money-trail stars entered, including Horton Smith, Sam Snead, Jimmy Thomson, Open Champion Ralph Guld, K. Luffton, Henry Dillard and scores of other luminaries.
