

UNUSUAL DISPLAY OF DOLLS SHOWN

One of the most unusual displays of dolls ever shown in Eugene will be found in the windows of Washburn's store this week depicting the early pioneer days in typical style and also the more formal aspect in the old-tin-types which grace the windows.

The figures used are not merely dolls—they are more like tiny people. Each doll is an individual creation with its own personality starting with its face and style of hair or beard and continuing throughout the detailed costume.

Costumes are authentic and complete to full shirts for the men and several petticoats for the women.

Four couples are arranged somewhat in the manner of early day tin-types—stiff poses and grim visages. These are shown in four different windows.

The pioneer motive is depicted in the corner window where are hung two large paintings by C. J. Fulton of Indians along the Columbia. The dolls in this window include a circuit rider and his wife on horseback with pack burro following. They precede an ox drawn covered wagon and a mounted pioneer. The settler family in the wagon includes one man, a boy, two women and a baby. The procession is completed by a dog following lazily in the tracks of the old wooden-wheeled wagon.

Every detail of all fifteen of these dolls was originated and made by Mrs. Anna Hissup of Cottage Grove. The entire figures and the costumes were made by her. Of particular interest are the horses and oxen which were also made by Mrs. Hissup.

Oregon Motorists Use Much Gasoline

SALEM, July 22.—(AP)—Oregon automobile drivers used 476.3 gallons of gasoline per minute during June, Secretary of State Earl Snell said today.

An all-time record for gasoline sales likely will be set in July because of increased tourist travel, he said. June was the second month this year in which gasoline sales passed the million dollar mark, receipts totaling \$1,028,851 paid on 20,576,315 gallons. The receipts exceeded June, 1936, by \$77,568.

Collections for the first six months this year totaled \$4,982,100, compared with \$4,678,336 for the same period last year.

WOUNDED GUNMAN CLINGS TO LIFE

HUGO, Okla., July 22.—(AP)—Return to a Texas prison farm loomed today for Roy "Pete" Traxler as the slippery southwest gunman continued to withstand the effects of a bullet wound over the heart.

His companion in a 12-day flight lay in a morgue, a victim of the desperado's own gun. The companion, Fred Tindol, was slain and Traxler was shot by two hostages the outlaws had kidnapped in their flight from almost 1,000 officers in southern Oklahoma. Frank Trimmy, 50, a farmer, and J. E. Benton, 44, oil field worker, snatched guns from the men's sides when the exhausted fugitives dozed in a car near Boswell, Okla.

"I tried to tell the guy he didn't need to shoot me because I was all through. But I just wasted my breath. He didn't wait for me to say anything. He just shot. I fell out of the car to keep him from killing me," Trimmy and Benton both fired at Tindol, then Benton turned his gun on Traxler.

Five New Cases of Tuberculosis Here

Five new cases of tuberculosis have been reported in Lane county in the past days, Dr. E. L. Gardner of the public health unit said Thursday. He said that in May, when a clinic was conducted in the Eugene high school for tuberculosis, two active cases were found.

Due to the increase in cases, Dr. Gardner said that an extensive campaign would be carried on this fall, giving every student in the Eugene school system the advantage of tuberculosis tests.

There are two cases of scarlet fever in the county as well as several cases of whooping cough. A slight increase in venereal diseases has also been reported.

or directed from the control booth deep in the intricacies of the set. In this booth, she has a microphone and she is near the control board for the various mechanical apparatus of the stage.

New in nearly every particular, the episodes this year depict the coming of the pioneer to Oregon via the famous Oregon Trail, his trek across the mountains, the settlement of the valley and the progress of industrial development. The scenes are larger, more impressive and more beautiful than in previous Pageants, those who have seen them all said, following the rehearsal. The Glacier Ballet, the Indian and covered wagons scenes and the religious scene near the end of the show are outstanding in their beauty, symbolism and effect.

The use of an electric organ in conjunction with the orchestra adds much to the Church in the Valley episode, a new act for the Oregon Trail Pageant and one believed by many to be the outstanding episode of the entire production.

Due to the huge cast, which instead of being held at 2,000 as was at first expected, has swollen to over 3,000, the show will run two and one-half hours rather than the two-hour limit originally set by Director Doris Smith, she said Thursday. With such a large cast, many of the scenes with massed characters move slightly more slowly than with fewer persons, therefore the extra half-hour will be required to present the Pageant this year.

Doubts that the huge stage could be filled by the cast were dispelled by the dress rehearsal which proved that the set and the characters are well balanced. A smaller stage would have been crowded, as it is, the effect is one of immense space with characters
