SALEM NEWSPAPER CHARGES "DEAL"—SALEM, July 2.—(AP)—The Oregon Statesman said today that charges of a political "deal" between J. D. Ross of Seattle and Claude McCulloch of Klamath Falls in the matter of federal appointments were current in the state capital.

"The charge is made that McCulloch, who was tarred with the Copco power brush when he nearly had the appointment for district judge in his hand, sought the help of J. D. Ross to give him 'political clearance' with the powers that be in Washington," the paper said in a signed story.

"Ross, a public ownership devotee as long time superintendent of city light, Seattle, is reported to have supplied clearance."

In return McCulloch, who is state chairman for the democratic party, made it known he would approve the choice of Ross for Bonneville administrator. Walter Pierce, congressman from eastern Oregon, McCulloch's district, has been boosting Ross for the job."

WOMEN EXERTING MORE INFLUENCE: BPW MEET CLAIMS—ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 23.—(AP)—The serpent has swallowed its tail, the cycle is ended, and the men may soon have to tie themselves to the kitchen and scrub the linoleum, say delegates to the national federation of business and professional women's convention.

They took stock today of an 80-year-old fight to throw off male dominance and resolved that victory was in sight.

Fifteen hundred delegates—successful women all, and leaders in business and industry—barked back to the day in 1848 when the first women's rights convention was held at Seneca Falls, N. Y., amid much jeering by males. There Elizabeth Cady Stanton submitted her famed "twelve sentiments" for the recognition of woman's equality with men.

The women didn't get very far beyond the noise stage until the men, in their blundering, got mixed up in a Civil war. Then women began to slide into their jobs.

Meanwhile, some smart women sold a school board the idea of hiring women teachers because of their "native feminine patience and understanding of children," and it's been going on ever since.

USURP MANY JOBS—Came the typewriter in 1874. Gentle, nimble fingers captured it. Came the telephone, and the soft, sweet voice soon won. Came the shirt factory, and more nimble fingers. Men snatched the type-setting machine before their daughters got to it, but never mind: Came the printer-teletype, the rapid calculator, the multi-graph. . . .

Then came more masculine blundering, and the men came back from the Spanish-American war and the World war to find more women doing their jobs.

All this time the women were creeping up behind the dominant male, with his governmental machinery. The climax—votes for women came in 1919-1920, and the male sighed in relief at learning the suspense was over.

Throughout the land women are climbing into high public office, and everywhere they are being recognized as ideal business leaders, the delegates observed today. Miss Iona Robertson Logie, vocational counselor

of the Hunter College high school, explained why: "They know how to handle men better than men know how to handle themselves."
