

CITY COUNCIL MEETING QUIET; CITIZENS HEARD

WHAT THE COUNCIL DID
DEFEATED a motion to hire a sanitary inspector.
APPROVED an investigation into present franchises now held with the city of Eugene.
AUTHORIZED a study of out-of-town fire department calls.
PASSED the purchase of two fire hydrants.

There will be no sanitary inspector in Eugene, at least for the remainder of this year.

The city council, confronted with the issue Monday night, promptly referred it to the budget committee session in November by a vote of five to two.

Appearance of two self-styled representatives of taxpayers featured the action of the council. E. G. Reese declared the large number "in the public trough" while E. A. Barrett declared that there was no need for extension and that the taxpayers' burden was already too heavy.

The health committee, headed by Arthur Henderson, recommended that the city expend \$300 for the remainder of the year for the hiring of a sanitary inspector. Councilman Bond objected.

A careful scrutiny of current franchises operating in the city of Eugene loomed Tuesday after the city council unlimbered machinery to get the investigation under way. The inquiry will affect Western Union and Postal Telegraph.

Just how the utilities are living up to their franchise, what they are paying the city and what they should be paying the city will take up the attention of the council.

It was a comparatively peaceful meeting, with the only speaker in interest arising on the matter of sanitary inspector.

Those speakers claiming to represent taxpayers, also objected to the additional expense. The council lost little time in defeating the motion, five to two.

The fire and water committee indicated that it would undertake a study of what to do about fire department calls made to out-of-town points. Mention was made of recent fires at the Lewis Lumber company mill in Pengra and fires near Cottage Grove.

Under the present ordinance, the city fire department may collect \$25 for the first hour, and \$15 per hour thereafter. As far as was ascertained, this ordinance has not been put into effect recently.

Several councilmen indicated that they favored more liberal terms with industrial firms than with private residences. It was pointed out that loss of industrial property meant loss of payrolls and community wealth.

Purchase of two fire hydrants was authorized.

Objections of north Polk street residents to the construction of an industrial firm were referred to the planning committee.

The Cole brothers circus was granted permission to stage a performance here August 29.

A bill of \$50.50 for the hiring of extra police during the Pageant week was approved.

Investigation of wood yards in operation near homes was authorized. These include wood yards at Eighteenth and Jefferson, 628 Olive and Sixteenth and Mill.

A C. I. O. delegation protested to Mayor Harold H. Burton that police made no effort to protect the C. I. O. union headquarters which was wrecked. Meanwhile Republic Steel corporation filed a suit to enjoin mass picketing at the Corrigan McKinney plant.

Spontaneous fighting between worker and striker groups reached a climax last night with a five-hour pitched battle in the valley fronting the main entrance of the plant.

More than 60 persons were injured, 100 or more automobiles damaged, shots fired, tear gas bombs thrown, and club wielded as indiscriminately as often, police said, members of the two groups were fighting their own men.

was \$520 in cash from individuals and alumni for purchase of rare books and help for the WPA art projects. The University; and the sale of a timber tract, the money to be used for a loan fund and Greek and Latin scholarships at the University.

Chief among a large number of personnel adjustments, many of them provided for in the budget but not filled at the last meeting, were the following:

University—appointment of Dr. Ralph W. Leighton to acting dean of the school of physical education, October 1, salary \$4,500 and continuation in the present rank of professor of education. Appointment of Dr. Francis P. Robinson, assistant professor of psychology, sabbatical leave at half pay for Miss Julia Burgess, professor of English, for one year to catalog the Burgess collection of rare books being purchased for the University through gifts.

Adjustments in rank: University—John Stein, band director, indefinite tenure, R. D. Horn from assistant to associate professor of English; Burt Brown Barker and Mrs. Gertrude Bass Warner assigned to ranks of professor.

The report of the finance committee recommending a shorter revised list of additional salary adjustments, held over from the June meeting, was approved. Total \$738 for all institutions, which was well within the budget approved at the last meeting.

Increases allowed, many for adjustments necessary to retain staff members, follow:

University—Ruth Chilcote, Roberta Moody, Una A. Clark, Rachael Van Osdal, secretarial staff; O. L. Rhine-smith, police; O. F. Stafford, dean, lower division; Elyer Brown, architect; D. L. Lewis, building and grounds; E. C. A. Lovell, E. G. Moll, English; A. H. Foote, building and janitorial supervisor, Total \$3,624.

State college—H. E. Cosby, poultry husbandry; F. O. McMillan and E. C. Starr, electrical engineering; C. Moekemoer, civil engineering; Harry I. Nettleton, forestry; Melissa Martin, modern languages; C. E. Owens, botany; W. E. Milne, mathematics; H. B. Auld, business office, Total \$2,762.

CITY SCHOOLS MAKE PROFIT OF \$67,000

the policy—to use the words of Percy W. Brown, auditor—will be continued in the future. Superintendent H. R. Gould declared Tuesday upon release of the report.

Most of the \$67,000 profit was used for paying off indebtedness, improving grounds and buildings, and purchasing of additional equipment and books.

At the same time, it was revealed that the warrant indebtedness of the city schools was down to \$54,000—the lowest figure since June 30, 1927.

Likewise, bonded indebtedness is \$300,000, which is lower than any year-end since 1924.

Assets Cited
Fixed assets of the city were set at \$910,630.87—including land (\$150,149), buildings (\$619,071), furniture (\$108,578), libraries (\$28,234), and textbooks (\$9,458). Added to this amount is \$204,500 in current assets.

There remains, however, \$268,000 in long-term bonds to be paid off, including \$100,000 on Wilson and Roosevelt school bonds.

The bonds maturing during the 1937-38 year come to a total of \$34,600.

JAPANESE BEGIN PEIPING ATTACK

China army made an "unprovoked attack on the Chinese garrison at Lang-fang" and then "presented impossible demands and staged provocative acts on the outskirts of Peiping."

SHANGHAI, July 28.—(Wednesday)—Independent foreign advisers from isolated Peiping said today that Japanese troops apparently had launched a major-scale attack aimed at expelling the entire 20th Chinese army from the area, and that American and other foreign quarter defense garrisons were manning the walls of their quarters.

These roundabout advisers—Peiping had but a single direct radio outlet—indicated severe fighting around the former Chinese capital.

They said Anglo-Italian and French-American embassy quarters defenders were posted on their compound walls.

(Tientsin advisers, direct to New York, said a representative of Lieut. Gen. Kiyoshi Katsuki, Japanese commander in North China, had notified the Chinese Commander Sung Chieh-Yuan that the Japanese military was making independent action. Gen. Katsuki advised Gen. Sung to remove all his troops from inside Peiping "as their presence within the walls might lead to confusion in hostilities, endangering foreigners.")

The general Japanese assault reported from Peiping seemingly followed upon new Japanese demands, which General Sung bluntly rejected. The Japanese apparently considered this rejection tantamount to Chinese refusal of their previous ultimatum, and threw their war machine into high gear.
