

CHINESE DRIVE JAPANESE BACK

Peiping. They said Yin Ju-King, head of the Chinese province autonomous regime, which favors Japan, had been captured at Tientsin, his "capital."

(A Domei Japanese news agency report to Tokyo said Japanese forces opened a heavy artillery bombardment of Chinese positions at Lukouchiao and Wansinghien, southwest and western suburbs of Peiping.)

Assure Safety

The Japanese embassy circulated a statement which reaffirmed previous declarations the Japanese army did not intend to take action against Peiping nor bomb the city from the air. The statement said the safety of all foreigners in the city was assured.

However, the Chinese 20th army dug trenches in front of the embassy quarter.

Japanese airplanes flew over the city, dropping leaflets asserting their determination to oust the 20th army.

Fighting subsided in large measure as the day ended. When darkness fell, cannon could be heard booming in the distance, however.

Americans and other foreigners within the walls faced the night cheerfully, apparently convinced the embassy quarter was a safe refuge.

COMMUNICATIONS CUT

PEIPING, July 28.—(Delayed AP—20 Hours).—The last remaining telegraph line from Peiping to Tientsin went dead at 6:45 a. m. today (5:45 p. m. Tuesday, E. S. T.). Peiping's only communication with the outside world was through limited radio facilities.

MAY MOVE AMERICANS

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(AP)—Secretary Hull said today that possible evacuation of American civilians from Peiping was being considered as one eventuality to be met in the present Sino-Japanese crisis.

He made the statement at his press conference shortly after it became known that President Roosevelt was keeping in constant touch with far eastern developments to determine, among other things, whether the neutrality act should be invoked.

BUDGET BUREAU BACKS UP IDEAS

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(AP)—The budget bureau arranged today to back up President Roosevelt's request for federal economy with advice to individual departments on how to curtail spending.

The chief executive suggested recently that ten per cent of all appropriations susceptible to reduction be impounded. He expressed hope that an estimated \$418,000,000 deficit for this year could be eliminated.

When departments submit estimates of savings, officials said, the budget bureau will determine whether all feasible reductions have been made. If bureau experts think further cuts are possible, they will confer with departmental representatives.

At his press conference yesterday, Mr. Roosevelt said departments are progressing satisfactorily with plans to whittle expenditures.

FOR SUGGESTS NAVY TRAINING

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, an old navy man himself, has suggested giving the nation's high school and college students an opportunity to get naval training during their summer vacations.

He told reporters he discussed the idea with navy authorities. Its aim is creation of a more adequate reserve corps.

Mr. Roosevelt proposed giving selected youths free board, lodging and clothes, and possibly transportation. He said he believed no new laws would be required.

The army now sponsors the citizens military training corps, which currently has 35,000 boys undergoing a month's training at an annual cost of about \$2,275,000.

MOVE MAY BLOCK NEW COURT BILL

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(AP)—Senate foes of the original Roosevelt court bill said today a proposal by Senator Minton (D-Ind) to expand the newly-written lower court reorganization bill threatened a contest which might prolong the congressional session.

Minton reiterated today his determination to ask the senate to amend the substitute court bill to require two-thirds decisions by the supreme court to invalidate acts of congress.

Soon after Minton had spoken it became known that President Roosevelt had summoned senate and house Democratic leaders to the White House for a late afternoon conference to discuss the legislative program.

Passion Play at Church Thursday

A new motion picture of the Passion Play, patterned after the Freiburg and Oberammergau productions in Germany, will be shown Thursday evening, July 29, at the First Christian church, at 8 o'clock. The motion picture has sound accompaniment, with organ, orchestral and choral music.

This production was filmed in Europe, the Holy Land and Egypt, and shows scenes in the life, crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus.

A silver offering will be taken during the evening. The public is invited.

FIRE HAZARDS IN FORESTS ARE BAD

(By The Associated Press)

High temperatures and continually lowering humidity increased fire hazards today in northwest forests, harassed by lightning storms almost daily since Sunday.

Crews of civilian conservation corps and other fighters moved against blazes in widely scattered parts of the northwest. Most of the blazes, notably in central Oregon, western Montana and north Idaho, and in western Washington, were believed to be nearing or under control.

Lightning scattered blazes in the Heppner, Monahan and Chish regions of Oregon, the Cascade range, the Longview regions of western Washington, and in many sections of western Montana and north Idaho.

erased before the "short" or dry pasture season, Mr. Perry said.

Cites Increases

Local dairymen point out that all items of milk production on their farms, including prices for dairy equipment, lumber, lime, paint, hardware, other building material, wages to farm workers, oil and practically all purchased feeds have advanced from ten to 45 percent within the past several months Mr. Perry stated.

Similar prices have been in effect in Klamath, Wasco, Multnomah, part of Clatsop, and other counties of the state for some time and similar advances are being petitioned for by dairymen in numerous other sections, it was pointed out.

The price advance, based upon a one-cent increase on quarts of four percent milk, applies to all units of both milk and cream on a proportionate basis.
