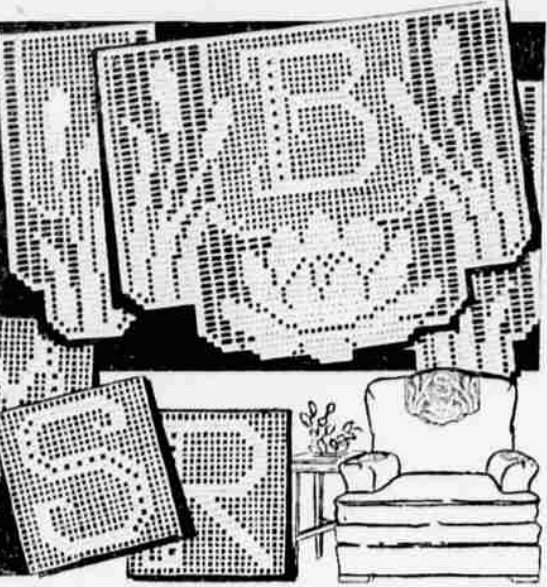

Clearing System Is Installed to Clear Dust, Halsey Plant

HAISEY, July 28.—(Special)—O. W. Frum has just completed the installation of a modern dust collecting system in the original warehouse with a bag cleaning attachment. The Archer Blower and Pipe company of Portland installed the pipe system and Hurdick Landon of Brownsville did the electrical work.

Any place that grain comes into contact with the air, at all dumping places and at end of each spout is a pipe to carry the dust away. Huge fans on the balcony of the cleaning department are responsible for the removal. A large galvanized pipe from the outlet of the roof of the building. In each elevator pipes have been inserted also to remove dust before it is dumped.

A magnetic separator on the chopper has also been installed. All metal is picked up before it enters the chopper thus saving many expensive repairs as well as guarding the cattle from foreign substances in their feed. It also reduces the fire hazard, as the chopper becomes very hot when in use, especially if metal enters.

The dust system also reduces fire hazard, as collected dust often settles. The health of the employees is also safeguarded.

Mr. Frum will probably install a similar system in warehouse No. 2 at a later date.
