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receives the golden talents of a glorious age of growth and wraps them in a napkin of conversation, the master returns and demands his talent with interest. And to the world has changed. For 5000 years man has followed the even tenor of his simple way—agriculture, modest production and trade and warfare all to a tempo restrained by the crudities of antique transportation of men and goods and thought.

"Then in the twinkling of a century, touched by the wand of a scientific Merlin, the earth shrinks in size, strangers become neighbors, the hum of wheels is heard in the land, and the sound of many voices, the old friends of the law proclaiming doctrines new and strange, voices reproachful of the conservator of their own earlier culture, sometimes forgetful that cause must precede effect, innovation precede custom and social science precede law.

"So What?"

"But thus looking backward we hear the curt insistent challenge of today, 'So What?' Ours is a teleological time and the mere narrative of a battle or an evolution will not suffice. We must have an answer ready and say what good comes of our observations at last.

"First we must venture that knowledge with a consequent sense of proportion is good in itself. Beyond that we must concede that explanation is not justification. The law may have followed in the path of expediency, it must answer for itself today."

PORTLAND, July 29.—(AP)—Reduction of the WPA rolls by 500,000 persons brought a protest to congress from the executive committee of the Portland Central Labor council. The committee contended that many of the persons thus dropped were in need and unable to obtain private employment.

PORTLAND, July 29.—(AP)—The Civil war, which started at Fort Sumpter, April 12, 1861, ended officially in Portland harbor aboard the cruiser New Orleans Wednesday.

Capt. A. T. Beauregard, grand-nephew of General P. G. T. Beauregard who commanded the confederate forces at Fort Sumpter, and Van W. Anderson of Portland, grand-nephew of Major Robert Anderson, who commanded the fort, shook hands and agreed to "call it quits."

BLACHLY TO HAVE NEW HIGH SCHOOL

Blachly school district will have a new high school building this year, plans having been made to commence construction work immediately, according to L. C. Moffitt, county school superintendent, who conferred with the Blachly school board Monday.

The new building will contain three rooms and will be located on the property where the present Triangle high school building on a bluff above the Simlaw river is situated. The old building, which has been used by both high school and grade school classes, will be used entirely by the latter.

On August 27 the people of Blachly will hold an election to revoke the \$5,000 negotiable warrant to be issued for the erection of the building, a technically having arisen making this action necessary. The question of transferring \$3,000 cash on hand to the building fund will also be voted upon.

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BEAUTY JUDGE IS HELD FOR ACTIONS

LOS ANGELES, July 29.—(AP)—Boris Posner sat in jail today with the same restraint and dignity that he said he commanded when he measured the ankles, waists and busts of 21 pretty girls who entered his bathing beauty contest.

But several of the girls testified that Posner's hands and remarks both strayed from the subject during the measurements, and he was held for sentence under the anti-lewd section of the state criminal law. There were 10 women and two men in the municipal court jury that convicted him last night.

Posner, a dapper theatre manager, was his own star witness. He sat erect and undisturbed when the complaining girls were brought before him.

June Dyer, 16, was the first. He told her to take off her blouse, she said, and she refused. But she did put her foot on a chair for him to measure her ankle.

"I recognize her," the tape-measure artist said. "I took the color of her eyes and hair and measured her, but my hands never strayed where they didn't belong."

He looked at Evelyn Groom, 18, the next witness, and recalled that he

had measured her and had suggested to her: "It would be a good thing if you have your body massaged, particularly your bust."

He gave the same advice to Opal Bryant, 20 and blonde, the next witness, he said.

"While I measured some of the girls I would tell them how to keep their figures. I told Miss Bryant she should take a Turkish bath and it would help her maintain her beautiful form."

Maximum penalty for Posner's act is six months in the county jail and a \$500 fine.
