

HWAY BOARD  
SIGNS CONTRACT  
FOR LANE DEBT

RELAND, Ore., July 30.—(AP)—The highway board here today signed a contract with the state highway commission for the construction of a new bridge over the Yamhill river near McMinnville. The bridge, which will be 1,000 feet long, will replace the old bridge which was destroyed by a fire in 1934. The new bridge will be built on a site which was previously owned by the state. The highway board is composed of representatives from the county and the state. The contract for the bridge was awarded to the Lane Construction Company. The estimated cost of the bridge is \$100,000. The bridge is expected to be completed by the end of the year.

Pine Mills Produce  
Less During Week

PORTLAND, Ore., July 30.—(AP)—New business totaling \$3,791,000 feet, or a decrease of 1 per cent below the previous week was reported today by Western Pine association for week ended July 24, based on reports of 118 mills. Shipments were 70,500,000 feet and production 94,013,000 feet. The same mills for the corresponding week a year ago showed figures 63,803,000 feet and production \$1,780,000 feet. From Jan. 1 to date, orders are 15 per cent above the same period a year ago.

PLAN FOR FLOOD  
CONTROL PUSHED

More than 2100 acres of land have been signed up for the flood control district in the Goshen-Coast Fork area and steps are being taken to file articles of incorporation of a company to enable the farmers of that section to apply for government aid, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, who attended a meeting of the farmers interested at Goshen Thursday night. That number of acres had been signed up prior to this meeting and more farmers signed that night.

When the property in the district is all signed up the farmers will file articles of incorporation with the secretary of state, and then apply to the army engineers for a survey looking to flood control. The engineers will then make a preliminary survey and file a report on the project before government aid can be secured.

Four other such companies have been formed in Lane county, seeking flood control funds. The first one organized was in the Goodpasture island district and the others are the River-view district, one in the northern part of Lane county and the southern part of Benton county, known as the Benton-Lane district, and the other is the Brown's Bend district in the vicinity of Waltherville.

ILA Withdraws Its  
Pickets From Store

PORTLAND, July 30.—(AP)—The International Longshoremen's association, involved in a jurisdictional dispute with the Teamsters' union since last May, withdrew warehouse unit pickets from the Meler & Frank department store today. Terms of the agreement were not announced. The I. L. A. group continued to picket the establishment after William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, ordered the Central Labor council to disqualify it for not accepting teamster jurisdiction at inland warehouses.

Union Manager Jailed  
For Attack On Owner

LAKEVIEW, July 30.—(AP)—Lakeview authorities jailed J. W. Henderson, union business manager, today on a \$1,000 bail as the result of an alleged fight with Robert Adams, Sr., owner of a mill where an unsuccessful strike was called earlier this week. The charge against the union officer was assault and battery. Adams said Henderson knocked him down and then kicked him in the face and body. The dispute arose following the discharge of a worker.

TRUCK OWNERS IN  
OREGON PROTEST

PORTLAND, July 30.—(AP)—More than 150 truck owners, all certified on relief, voted last night to ignore calls for bids on WPA projects in August in protest against a recent ruling permitting non-relief owners of a single piece of equipment to make bids.  
The ruling, effective next Monday, was described as contrary to the intent of the relief program, and an encouragement to owners of fleets of trucks to transfer titles to individuals in order to participate in the work.  
State Representative Jack Wagner, secretary of the Oregon Truck-owners' association, said protests, including one from Governor Martin, had been sent to WPA officials.  
Wagner asserted that a WPA order of July 20 said truck owners were not to be considered as part of the employment quota nor included in the unemployment count, and charged an attempt to wipe out the list of certified relief trucks.

day of wrecking Great Britain's new plans for European neutrality in the Spanish civil war.  
He declared Germany could not enter further discussions on the plans because Russia had flatly rejected granting of belligerent rights to the Spanish insurgent cause.  
Viscount Cranborne, under-secretary for foreign affairs, disclosed to the house of commons Italy had renewed her pledge to Great Britain to respect the territorial integrity of civil war-torn Spain.

In the Spanish war itself, two unidentified submarines rose out of French waters to make a Spanish government freighter with gunfire and left her blazing with 23 officers and men missing.  
Two government tankers, La Valenta and La Zorroza were also shelled by submarines but were able to continue for Valencia.  
In eastern Spain, slowly but thoroughly, the insurgents pushed a northern arm toward the Madrid-Valencia highway, vital government communications artery.

Insurgent planes bombed Cuenca province and infantrymen consolidated newly won mountainous territory between Albarracin and the border of Cuenca.
