IRRIGATION SYSTEM NEARS COMPLETION

SPRINGFIELD, July 31.—(Special)—The construction of a larger irrigation set-up for Springfield is now nearing completion, it was announced here this week by Howard Amen, supervising engineer.

The project was begun a year ago last spring by the Eugene-Springfield Land and Water company to permit the irrigation of more acres surrounding Springfield and will be operating within a week, according to Mr. Amen.

The building program included the construction of a new irrigation canal a short distance from the old and smaller one and the building of a connecting link between the two. The additional canals make for a larger flow of water to meet the demands of irrigation north of Springfield.

It is expected that the project will be completed during the annual Willamette Valley Irrigation tour scheduled for August 19, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent.

10:30 a. m.—Farm of Geo. H. Johnson on south bank of Siuslaw river, three and one half miles below Mapleton.

11:30 a. m.—Farm of Ellington brothers on Siuslaw creek about two miles from the Johnson farm.

12:30 p. m.—Basket dinner at Siuslaw picnic grounds on Siuslaw creek. (Coffee will be furnished.)

1:30 p. m.—Recent developments of interest to coast farmers at the Astoria branch experiment station, by H. B. Howell, superintendent.

2:00 p. m.—Irrigation for western Lane county, by Arthur King, extension soil conservationist, Oregon Agricultural college.

2:30 p. m.—How western Lane farmers can benefit by cooperating in the agricultural conservation program, by O. S. Fletcher, county agent.
