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ROOSEVELT SPEAKS ON DOLLAR "PLAN"

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said in a letter to Senator Thomas (D-Okla.), made public today, that "it would be dangerous to adjust ourselves to any rigid pattern" in seeking to stabilize value of the dollar.

Mr. Roosevelt referred to "the complexity of the rapidly shifting international scene at present" in raising objections to Thomas' proposal to create a sliding scale of values by altering the dollar's theoretical gold content.

Thomas made public the president's views at a senate hearing on his bill.

"I am in complete sympathy with your objective with respect to the elimination of unnecessary fluctuations in the value of the dollar," the United States is still seeking "the kind of dollar which a generation hence will have the same purchasing power as the value we hope to attain in the near future."

"I am sure that you also agree with me that stabilization of the value of the dollar will be attained not merely by monetary means and devices—though these are necessary—but much more by the achievement of balanced and orderly recovery throughout the whole economy, and by its maintenance once achieved."

"However, in view of the complexity of the rapidly shifting international scene at present it would be dangerous to adjust ourselves to any rigid pattern."

"It is doubtful whether any procedure on the lines you suggest will be rewarded with that measure of success which we could justly expect were the international situation to have undergone clarification."

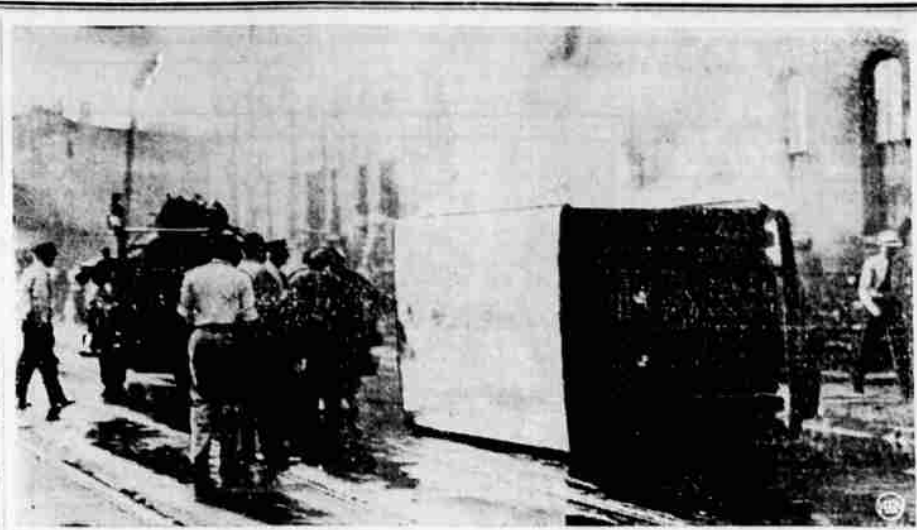
