FOREIGN countries have been nibbling away for many years at what was once a tremendous Chinese Empire. Even in modern times, during the last 200 years, continuous inroads have been made, and not even since the turn of the 20th century has vast, sprawling, loosely-knit China been able to halt the centrifugal forces tending to break her up. The contrasting maps above, showing China as she was when dad studied his geography before the turn of the century, and as she is today, tell the story. The table of events below shows some of the principal events in the partition of the once-mighty territories of China.

- 1516—Portuguese seize Macao (permanent leasehold)
- 1842—In the Opium War, Hong Kong was ceded to the British.
- 1858—In a second war with the British, the Kowloon peninsula, opposite Hong Kong, was also ceded to the British.
- 1885—War with the French, resulting in the ceding of Annam to the French (French Indo-China).
- 1886—British claims to Upper Burma recognized by China—Siam divided British and French.
- 1895—Korean War. Independence of Korea recognized. Formosa ceded to Japan.
- 1897—Germans seize Tsingtao and Kiaochow; Russians seize Port Arthur, Taitienwan and Kwangtung, tip of the Liaotung peninsula.
- 1900—Boxer rising—Russia emerges with firm grip on Manchuria.
- 1904—Russo-Japanese War. Japan takes Korea and the Liaotung peninsula.
- 1910—Korea formally annexed to Japan.
- 1911—Tibet and Outer Mongolia declare their independence, the former under pronounced British influence, the latter under pronounced Russian influence, amounting almost to annexation.
- 1914—Japan ousts Germany from Tsingtao and Shantung.
- 1915—Germany presents China with the famous 21 demands.
- 1917—Japan makes secret agreement with the Allies (not the U. S.) to get Shantung when peace is made.
- 1919—Versailles treaty gives Shantung to the Japanese.
- 1922—Shantung returned by Japan under the Washington treaty and nine-power pact.
- 1924—Outer Mongolia Sovietized, despite Russian guarantee of Chinese sovereignty.
- 1929—Russian troops, after border trouble, capture all of Manchuria west of the Khingan mountains.
- 1932—Japanese invasion of Shanghai marks beginning of Manchukuo.
- 1933—Japanese invade Jehol, take it over. Hoped, north of Peiping, "demilitarized."
- 1935—Japanese move south of the Great Wall, seize part of Chahar and Hopei.
- 1937—Present conflict suggests further move southward by Japan to detach northern China from the Nanking government.

to spread the blaze before nightfall to tremendous proportions, however, while fighters on the ground sought desperately to stem its advance.

Forest executives described yesterday's "blowup" of the Spud Hill fire as a spectacular demonstration that fire fighters were powerless to check. Before a brisk afternoon wind the blaze broke its bounds to reach an area covered with 55 year old green fir trees in which it "crowned" eating a path from tree to tree and fattening on resinous needles of the young trees.

Clark said the process in distributing the literature involved "employing the machinery of the senate to cover senators' desks with propaganda."

McNary asserted that acceptance of responsibility for distributing the statement by Wagner "does not cover the case."

The republican leader said it was "the boldest attempt to influence legislation I have seen in 20 years in the senate."

were installed it would give Lane county the best system of county accounts in the state.

The report shows that while there was a balance of unexpended funds in the various budget items for 1936 of \$16,375.99 several of the funds were overdrawn. Others showed a good balance at the end of the year. The funds overdrawn and the amount of each were as follows: Bounty, \$192; circuit court, \$1470.93; care of poor, \$3014.34; district sewer, \$50.05; juvenile court, \$309.89; mothers' aid, \$2474; tax rebate, \$154.67; thistle control, \$0.75; health service, \$112.78; unemployment relief, \$650.21.

The total amount budgeted was \$213,232.45 and additions made amounted to \$14,251.51. Warrants issued amounted to \$189,917.17 and other deductions were \$11,174 leaving a balance of \$16,375.99.

Not True Balance

The auditor says in his report that on account of the large amount of unexpended taxes held by the county treasurer as of December 31, 1936, her records do not show the true fund balances as of that date. "This account should be discontinued or a complete segregation of all tax funds on hand made before the records are closed for the year," the report stated.

The financial balance sheet of the report contains the following figures: Cash in hands of treasurer, \$224,001.75; cash in tax department, \$91.72; cash in license department, \$140.60; cash in clerk's revolving fund, \$370.14; uncollected taxes, \$1,874,379.14; total current assets, \$2,100,029.16.

Fixed assets are given as follows: Land, \$127,550; tax owned land, \$200,000; equipment, \$123,000; permanent roads, \$1,500,000; total fixed assets, \$2,150,550; total assets, \$4,250,579.19.
