

WHOOPING COUGH LED CONTAGIOUS DISEASES IN JULY

More cases of whooping cough than any other communicable diseases appeared in Lane county during the month of July, according to the monthly report of the Lane county health unit. Nineteen were reported. The unit includes the work done by Drs. Gardner, Romig and Chapman of the health unit, Dr. Heltzer, milk inspector, the public health nurses and the office nurse.
