AMERICAN GIRL SAID KIDNAPED
PARIS, August 7.—(AP)—Newspapers and police today sought Miss Jean De Koven, 23, American dancer, who, according to one of a series of reports, is being held for a modest \$500 ransom by an inept kidnaper.

Miss De Koven has been absent for two weeks from her Latin Quarter hotel, and her aunt, Miss Ida Sackheim, appealed yesterday to the American embassy for aid. The embassy, in turn, called in the police. They said they could not, pending investigation, accept the kidnaper theory.

Miss De Koven left her hotel one afternoon, saying she would be back for dinner. A short time before, she had made friends with a young man who lives on the other side of Paris. He used to send her letters, at least once a day, by a taxicab driver, who would wait for her answers.

The story was that soon after Miss De Koven's disappearance the aunt received a letter demanding \$500, failing which Miss De Koven was to be killed.

Certificate Stolen From Japanese Ship Loading at Coos Bay
MARSHFIELD, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Whether or not the current trouble in China had anything to do with it, the certificate of navigation was missing today from the new Japanese freighter, M. S. Kozumi Maru, lifting lumber at Coos Bay dock for Japan after her maiden voyage from the Orient.

Captain I. Moriama blamed a curio seeker for removing the sailing permit from the glass case which the captain admitted he had left unlocked. No Japanese vessel is allowed to sail in American waters without such a certificate. Frank Shaw of International Stevedores Co., offered a reward for return of the paper with a promise that no questions would be asked.

HAY FEVER CURE
NEAR PERFECTION

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Modern science is providing hay fever victims this season with an efficacious method of diagnosis and treatment, a specialist announced today. The specialist, for ethical reasons, denied use of his name.

Pollen tests for trees, grasses and weeds, and tests for allergic disturbances provide the background for the treatments which consist of injections of solutions made from substances which react in the form of hives on the skin, he said. Relief is obtained in about 90 per cent of the cases. Even tiny doses of the immunizing solutions bring relief in most cases, he added.

The treatment consists of building up immunization gradually through injections superficially under the skin until a potency equal to the tolerance of the patient is reached.

Permanent relief, the physician pointed out, can be obtained in 40 to 50 per cent of the cases after five to eight years of such treatment.

The most critical stage of the hay fever season will begin about Aug. 15 and continue until frost kills plant life.

United States Claims Territory
In San Francisco Bay; Mission
Rock Now Belongs To The People

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The United States had a new territorial possession today in Mission Rock of San Francisco bay, which is really two rocks with an area of 15-1600ths of an acre above the water.

The conquest was made without a struggle by a landing party of one U. S. naval officer and U. S. marshal and a deputy U. S. district attorney. The entire population, consisting of a caretaker, was banished in exile to the mainland and the Stars and Stripes of the United States of America were hoisted triumphantly.

Mission Rock juts up in the bay a quarter mile off the foot of Mission street. Once it was a docking place for sailing vessels. President McKinley first claimed it for the government in 1899. The supreme court of the United States approved the annexation in 1903. The verdict was that the part of the rock above water belonged to the United States, and the part below was the property of the Mission Rock corporation.

The corporation had warehouses on the rock and for 38 years it defied the United States with prolonged litigation. Fire swept the warehouses this summer and disaster struck again yesterday. The invading force was comprised of Lieut. Harry Zoller, U. S. N.; Marshal George Rice and Deputy Attorney William Licking.

The corporation bought the rock from Henry P. Pichener, who obtained it by legislative grant from the state of California in 1872.

In conquest, Mission Rock will be converted to navy uses.

Pan-American Clipper Completes Ocean Trip
PORT WASHINGTON, N. Y., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Pan-American Clipper III today completed its second experimental round trip flight across the Atlantic ocean. The huge flying boat, commanded by Capt. Harold E. Gray, landed here at 4:23 p. m. EDT, from Botwood, N. F., where it arrived yesterday from Fomes, Ireland.

DEMOS. G. O. P.'S
HIRE SAME EXPERT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—It was disclosed today that Democrats and Republicans hired the same "expert" to put over their convention yearbooks last summer.

In the midst of Republican charges that the Democratic national committee had violated the corrupt practices act through sales of deluxe yearbooks to corporations, it was learned that John B. Gallagher, New York and Philadelphia publisher, had been employed to submit inventories for the convention books of both parties.

Charles Michelson, of the Democratic national committee, confirmed the report. He said that Gallagher was employed on a commission basis under a contract with the late W. Forbes Morgan, secretary-treasurer of the committee.

Spokesmen at the Republican national committee said that Gallagher was employed by the Republican convention committee, Inc., Cleveland, which is a separate organization from the national committee.

They explained that the book was to raise funds to defray expenses of the convention and that no effort was made afterward to sell it during the campaign.

FAMOUS CHEF IS
KILLED IN HOME

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Henry Chateau, 53, chef to the notable of two continents, was dead today, the victim of a bullet which police said was fired from his own rifle.

Circumstances surrounding his death, however, led police to investigate the possibility of murder.

They reported that two men drove to his home shortly before his death and that one of the men spoke to the chef briefly at his front door and then said he would see him in his garage.

In the interval during which Chateau walked down an inside stair to his garage to open the door it was believed he obtained his rifle from which he previously had removed the stock.

The rifle, with one bullet fired and a shell still in the chamber, was found near him on the floor of the garage. Chateau was shot through the head.

Chateau was a member of the chef's association and had been on strike recently along with employees of the leading hotels of San Francisco.

He had served as chef of the William Randolph Hearst San Simeon ranch, and had worked in Maxim's in Paris, the Waldorf-Astoria in New York, and leading cafes in San Francisco.
